TIMBER AND STONE LAW

Registers and receivers have received from Washington a number of copies of new regulations governing the sale of public lands that come under the timber and stone law act of June 3, 1878. The new regulations completely change the methods by which public lands have been sold in the past. They will go into effect immediately.

The regulations under the act of June 3, 1878 (20 Stat., 89), and amendatory acts, commonly known as the timber and stone law, are hereby revised, modified, and reissued as follows:

May Be Appraised.

Any lands subject to sale under the foregoing acts may, under the direction of the commissioner of the general land office, upon application or otherwise, be appraised by the smallest legal subdivisions, at their reasonable value, but at not less than \$2.50 per acre; and hereafter no sales shall be made under said acts except as provided in these regulations.

Any qualified person may obtain title under the timber and stone law by performing the following acts: (a) Personally examining the land desired; (b) presenting an application and sworn statement, accompanied by a filing fee of \$10; (c) depositing with the receiver the appraised price of the land; (d) publishing notice of his application and proof; (e) making final proof.

Examination of the land must be made by the applicant in person not more than thirty days before the date of his application, in order that he may knowingly swear to its character and condition.

Make Sworn Statement.

The application and sworn statement must contain the applicant's estimate of the timber, based on examination and his valuation of the land and the timber thereon, by separate items. It must be executed in duplicate, after having been read to or by the applicant, in the presence of the officer administering the oath, and sworn to by him before such officer, who may be either the register or receiver of the land district in which the land is located, a United States commissioner, a judge or a clerk of a court of record in the county or parish, if he is nearer and more accessible to the land, than any other qualified officer, and has his office or place of business within the land district in which the land is located. Each applicant must at the time he presents his application and sworn statement, deposit with the receiver, either in cash or in postoffice money orders payable to the receiver, a filing fee of \$10.

After application and deposit have been filed in proper form as required by these regulations, the register and receiver will at once forward a copy of the application to the chief of field division. If he finds no legal objection to the application, he shall cause the lands applied for to be appraised by an officer or employee of the government.

When the appraisal is completed, the register and receiver will note the price on their records, and thereafter the land will be sold at such price only under the provisions of the timber and stone acts, unless the land shall have been reappraised in the manner provided herein.

Unless the land department, as hereinbefore provided or otherwise as directed by the secretary of the Interior, shall appraise any lands applied for under these regulations within nine months from the date of such application, the applicant may, without notice, within thirty days, thereafter, deposit the amount, not less than \$2.50 per acre, specified in his application as the reasonable value of the land and the timber thereon, with the receiver, and thereupon will be allowed to proceed with his application to purchase as though the appraisal had been regularly made. The failure of the applicant to make the required deposit within thirty days after the expiration of the nine months appraisal period will terminate his rights without notice.

After the appraisal or reappraisal and deposit of purchase money and fee have been made, the register will fix a time and place for the offering of final proof and name the officer before whom it shall be offered and post a notice thereof in the land office and deliver a copy of the notice to the applicant to be by him and at his expense published in the newspaper of accredited standing and general circulation published nearest the land applied for. This notice must be continuously published in the paper for sixty days prior to the date named therein as the day upon which final proof must be offered.

DISHES MUST BE SCALDED.

Tacoma Health Board Issues Edict to Restaurants.

TACOMA, Wash., June 18.—Simply giving dirty dishes a passing introduction to water and soap will not be tolerated in Tacoma under the new rules laid down to restaurant keepers by Health Commissioner La Gasa.

The health commissioner made a tour of inspection today and found

that only a few of the eating-houses scalded their dishes. "They have got to give them a long bath and a proper scrubbing hereafter," declared the commissioner.

Dr. La Gasa has ordered several of the restaurants to make their kitchens sanitary.

AGAINST SUFFRAGE.

Cardinal Gibbons Takes a Decided Stand Against It.

EMERSON, June 18.—In an address to the girl graduates of St. Joseph college, Cardinal Gibbons declared against woman suffrage, saying: "If you play in the arena of politics, you will be covered with dust. If you grasp too much you will lose everything."

He spoke of the great mission of women in life and urged that they appreciate deeply the responsibility in the domestic walks of life and of their influence on their fathers and brothers. Concluding he said: "Woe to society if it had to depend on the male sex alone—it would certainly go to the devil."

COLLEGE GRADUATE.

He Is Only 14 Years Old, but Received His Diploma.

MEDFORD, Mass., June 18.—Norbert Weiner, a senior in Tufts college, this city, who will be 14 years old June 16, will receive a diploma at the college commencement as bachelor of arts, but he will be entered on the rolls of Tufts as having completed a full four years' course in three years.

Wiener is the most remarkable student on the roll of any college or university. When he was 18 months old he knew the English alphabet; at 3 years he could read and write; at 5 he studied Latin; at 6 he had mastered arithmetic, algebra, plane and solid geometry; at 8 he read books in Latin, German, French and Russian readily; at 9 he could reason problems in trigonometry and calculus, and was given dealing on ancient astronomy.

THIEVES RETURN MONEY.

However, They Held Out \$5000 for Furnishing Their Home.

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 18.—A special dispatch from Seattle says Mrs. George Shea of Duluth, who notified the police that on May 30, \$20,000 she had concealed under a mattress on her bed had been stolen, has received \$15,000 in a letter signed "Two Thieves." The writer says they used \$5000 to furnish their home and, having no further use for the money, returned it to the owner.

PLUNGED INTO RIVER.

Engine and Tender Jumped Track and Went Into River at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 19.—A locomotive on the Great Northern Seattle express due at Vancouver this afternoon at 3:45, jumped the track while crossing the Fraser river on the Westminster bridge. The engine and tender went into the river. Engineer George D. Zeigewald and Fireman W. D. Snyder, both of Seattle, were drowned. Four of the cars, filled with passengers, were left standing on the bridge over the trestle over which the engine and tender had plunged.

That the entire train did not run into the river was undoubtedly due to the fact that as soon as the air connection was broken when the tender went over the brakes on all the cars were set automatically. The train was running slowly. The river when the engine went down is 40 feet deep.

GOBBLING UP ELECTRIC POWER

SAN FRANCISCO, June 16.—In pursuing the plan for the acquisition of mountain power rights and the construction and control of electric railways in California, Edward H. Harriman has bought from Henry E. Huntington the electric power and electric road properties in and around the town of Fresno.

The consideration, as approximately as can be ascertained, is \$2,000,000, payable part in cash and part in Southern Pacific company 4 per cent bonds.

One of the properties purchased is the plant of the San Joaquin Power company in the mountains east of Fresno.

Another property is the Fresno electric traction system, consisting of about 22 miles of road.

100 Miles of Projected Roads. Another part of the purchase consists of rights of way for 100 miles of projected suburban and interurban electric lines.

These proposed lines are as follows:

Fresno to Wawona, 79 miles; Fresno to Selma; Fresno to Trimmer's Springs; Fresno to Central and Washington colonies.

The properties are incorporated for five millions of stock, with an authorized bond issue for a similar amount. Only a part of the stock and bonds has been sold. A. C. Balch of Los Angeles and A. G. Wishon of Fresno have for several years been in active charge of these properties for H. E. Huntington.

This purchase was perfected in New York several weeks ago by William F. Herrin, acting for both parties, on the eve of his departure and that of Mr. Harriman for Europe.

Plans to Electrify System.

In the acquisition of electric properties in California Harriman since 1901 has spent more than \$10,000,000. These operations would seem to indicate that he is, or soon will be, as strongly entrenched in California electric roads and power plants as he is in steam railroad domination.

The deal with Huntington is of more significance than the price would imply. It means a steady, persistent, systematic purpose on the part of the Southern Pacific magnate to get control of power rights and plants wherever possible in California for the future uses of both his steam and electric lines. He expects at some time in the future to use electricity instead of steam on many sections of the Southern Pacific. He is already electrifying the suburban lines across the bay. When the time is ripe in his opinion to electrify portions of the Southern Pacific in the Santa Clara, San Joaquin and Sacramento valleys, he will want power at a minimum price and a certainty as to quantity.

This a Strategic Point.

Again, the deal means another strategic electric road point for the purpose of Mr. Harriman. He already has Stockton, San Jose, Los Angeles and Sacramento. By obtaining an electric railroad footing either in or around the seven or eight large cities of the state, the magnate and his advisers are confident they can head off successful competition by his Southern Pacific steam road. If his steam road is in danger at any point he can use his electric line against anyone seeking that kind of investment.

The Fresno purchase, together with the electric properties he owns in and around Stockton, also means that Harriman is in a stronger position than ever today to outwit anybody who might desire to build an electric system in the San Joaquin valley paralleling the Southern Pacific. Huntington entertained that idea several years ago, but abandoned it when Harriman became his southern partner.

Further investigation brought to light several leather sacks resembling government mail pouches, filled with raw silk and a number of boxes of expensive Manila cigars. The bags of silk are supposed to have been taken aboard with the mail sacks.
