HIGHEST AND BEST.

A Cherry Tree at Gold Hill Said to Be the Best in Oregon.

George Lyman of Gold Hill has a Royal Ann cherry tree which he claims is the biggest and best tree in Oregon south of the Willamette, where they have trees 20 years older than the one on his place.

This tree was planted 34 years ago and for over 30 years has been in bearing. There have been some wonderful crops of cherries picked from the tree, but no accurate account has ever been kept. This year cherries to the amount of nearly 200 gallons have been accounted for and there are still many gallons on the tree which, owing to its size and spread of the limbs, are inaccessible.

The tree forks about four feet above the ground and at that point it is 51 inches in circumference. The limbs spread over a territory of 50 feet in diameter and its height is estimated at 45 feet. The tree is nearly perfect in shape and proportion, the crown being dome shaped and the ends of the limbs almost equidistant from the trunk on every side.

Mr. Lyman claims it to be the largest and most prolific tree of the variety in southern Oregon, and the facts above seem to prove it.—Gold Hill News.

DEATH OF MRS. STEWART.

The Wife of F. M. Stewart Died Yesterday—Funeral Here Sunday.

Yesterday F. M. Stewart of The Morning Mail received a letter from Salem stating that his wife, who has been in that city for treatment for several weeks, was not expected to live. Mr. Stewart tried in vain to get aboard the Shasta Limited train. Before the evening train was due he received a telegram stating that Mrs. Stewart had expired at 1:30 o'clock.

John Stewart, the only son, who lives at San Diego, Cal., has been notified and it is expected will be here for the funeral, which will be held in this city Sunday. Mr. Stewart left for Salem last night and will accompany the remains here.

The funeral services of Mrs. F. M. Stewart will be held at the family residence, 335 North Central avenue, this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Rev. C. H. Hoxie officiating. The interment will be at the Odd Fellows' cemetery and the members of the W. R. C. will have charge at the grave. Friends and acquaintances are invited.

ANOTHER MISSING MAN

W. C. Wymer Has Disappeared from His Home

The Medford police are of the opinion that if many more men turn up missing around this city that it will be entitled to get a prize for leading all other places in Oregon in that line.

The latest one to be reported is that of a man of the name of W. C. Wymer, who left his home on Cottage avenue, East Medford, last Thursday night and, although the police have been making diligent search, so far no trace of the missing man can be found, except that a man is now under arrest who had in his possession Mr. Wymer's watch.

Came From California.

The missing man came here with his wife and two children from California about two weeks ago. Until they got settled the children were left in the care of relatives at Central Point. Mr. and Mrs. Wymer took up their residence on Cottage avenue. He is a painter and expected to work here at his trade. Thursday he left, presumably to walk down town. That was the last seen of him by either his wife or anyone else as far as can be learned.

Man Had His Watch.

Last night the police learned that some man had a watch which they thought belonged to Wymer. An investigation showed that this was the case and the man was placed under arrest.

Mrs. Wymer states that she and her husband never had a quarrel or even bad words. She is unable to in any way account for the reason why her husband should leave. She is inclined to the belief that it is a case of foul play, and the police are now of the opinion that she may possibly have reason to believe so after finding the man here with his watch.

CITY WELL COMPLETED.

The Central Point Herald Tells Something About City Well.

B. J. Adyott finished cementing the city well Saturday and it is now ready for the permanent pumps.

The walls are laid with cement blocks with open joints, from the bottom to a point above the water bearing gravel strata, thus allowing a free flow of water from the gravel into the well. From that point the walls are concreted and made water tight, thus shutting out all possibility of the well becoming contaminated from an inflow of surface water.

The well is an excellent piece of work throughout and the inflow of water is ample to supply all needs of the town when it is much larger than at present.

HAD A RUNAWAY.

A telephone message was received yesterday from Eagle Point telling that Fred Reincke of this city, who was driving to Butte Falls, had gotten mixed up in a runaway and was badly injured. Mrs. Reincke left on the first train for Eagle Point.

MAKING SMALL PARK.

C. F. Cook, the Nurseryman, Is Doing a Public-Spirited Act.

The intention is to plant flowers and shrubs and place seats around, so that people who desire to do so can take a rest there. Mr. Cook is having the work done and intends to have it when finished a credit to himself and the city.

TRYING FOR OIL.

Colonel Mundy Is Trying Here and Also at Roseburg.

Colonel Mundy returned yesterday from Roseburg, where he has been attending to the work of sinking a well with the expectation of procuring an oil well. He reports that they are now 1100 feet and that they are prepared to go 3000 feet before they decide to quit.

Regarding the well near Medford, Colonel Mundy states that the first one tried was a failure. It had to be plugged up, but tomorrow work will begin on another about 1100 feet from the other place. The colonel still has faith in the proposition and is willing to back that faith with all the money necessary to try the matter out.
