A MISCONSTRUCTION

Land Office Makes a Clear Ruling on Mining Lands

The following notice has been received from the department of the interior, general land office, Washington, D. C., which should be of considerable interest to mining men in this state:

Registers and Receivers U. S. Land Offices—Sirs: The attention of the department has been called to the last clause of paragraph 41 of the mining regulations, approved March 29, 1909, which provides as follows:

"The vein or lode must be fully described, and the description to include a statement as to the kind and character of mineral, the extent thereof, whether ore has been extracted and of what amount and value, and such other facts as will support the applicants' allegation that the claim contains a valuable mineral deposit."

It seems that the expression, "the extent thereof" is being construed as meaning that the applicant must affirmatively show by proof of exploration that the vein exists in fact throughout the whole length of the claim.

This construction of the paragraph is erroneous. By the words quoted it was intended to require the claimant to show the existence of a vein in such workings as he relied on to establish a discovery. By the extent of the vein was meant its size and quality as disclosed. That being done, the presumption exists that the vein extends on its strike throughout the whole length of the claim as located.

The sole purpose of that part of paragraph 41 quoted was to enable the land department to know, so far as applicant can reasonably show, the definite facts upon which the right to the patent is predicated so as to determine whether a valuable mineral deposit exists in the land claimed.

You will give this as wide publicity as possible, furnishing it to such newspapers in your district as may want to publish it or refer to it as a matter of news.

DECISION STIRS HORNETS' NEST

In granting a perpetual injunction against the appropriation by the state for the Crater Lake road, Judge Galloway has stirred up the animals in the southern part of the state, says a Portland paper. The bill carrying the appropriation was only passed after a hard campaign in the recent legislature, and the men who boosted for the scenic road do not intend lying down because of the court's decision. The matter will be appealed to the supreme court, where the constitutionality of the act is to be tested. When it comes to the supreme court the friends of the road feel confident that they will win, for a palpable reason. The legislature which passed the Crater Lake road bill, which is held unconstitutional, also increased the number of members of the supreme bench, when the constitution says that there shall be three supreme justices. The road people contend that if one act was unconstitutional then the other was, and that if the legislature had no right, then it had no right to increase the number of justices. The supreme court may entertain a similar idea.

Contention of Judge Galloway is that the appropriation for the Crater Lake road would benefit but two counties. The argument of the road advocates at Salem was that the two counties interested were willing to tax themselves heavily toward the project, and that the United States government would invest thousands of dollars more than the state of Oregon, and that Harriman himself would chip in \$50,000. The argument was that the Crater Lake road is not a local enterprise, but a statewide proposition, for the state at large would benefit through the advertising the scenic wonders would receive and that thousands of tourists would visit Oregon who otherwise would not come here. Large delegations from Medford and Ashland lobbied at the legislature through the session, being reinforced by Portland people, and they put up such a strong fight that the appropriation eventually carried.

Pit for Automobiles. Pending the state assistance, the people in the Crater Lake territory have been building the road and making it fit for automobiles. The lake can now be reached by motor cars, but with the lavies from the counties, the state and the federal government the road was to be made wide, solid and enduring. The decision of Judge Galloway will be fought persistently.

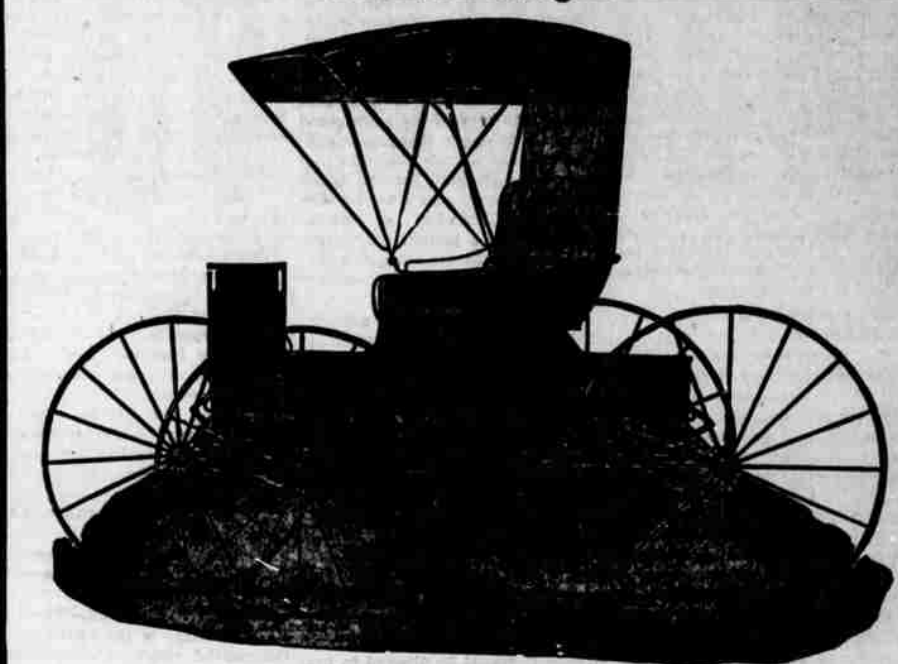
