THE MEN TO BLAME

For Them Women Wear Unbecoming Costumes

NEW YORK, July 7.—"The New York women who belong to a class that is best described as the floating population, are being crippled by the Paris fashions, and the men of Paris and New York are responsible for it. 'New York women of a certain type distort their figures by the clothes they wear until they no longer resemble the human feminine form.'"

"They wear corsets too tight to bend in."

"Shoes too ridiculous to walk in."

"Collars so high and so tight that they cannot breathe properly."

"And a harness of garters that makes them walk like horses with the stringhalt."

In an interview today Dr. Sarah J. McNutt, one of New York's most eminent women physicians, made these statements and agreed with the quoted sartorial beliefs of Samuel Paul of the United Tailors' association of America.

Becoming Cripples.

"The women of this country are becoming cripples through Paris styles," Paul assures us. "Some women have to practice for months before they can learn to walk in the short-waisted, tight-hipped creations. If they wanted to sit down while wearing them they would need a force of three men to give assistance."

"And what Mr. Paul says is quite true," affirmed Dr. McNutt, "but he forgets to add that it is men who are responsible for the very things he condemns."

Continuing, she said: "First, I have always thought that many of the fashion extremes and absurdities that come to us from Paris would never have been launched if men had not been directly responsible. They would never have been thought of by women. Practically all the fashion makers in Paris are men. They will never have to wear the freak styles they invent, and I suppose we must pardon them if they are not very considerate of women's physical comfort in their endeavors to devise startling fashions and modes."

Would Welcome Moderation. "The ground on which I would hold the men responsible for women's dress absurdities goes deeper into human nature. The barbarian in man admires extremes of dress, what we might call 'striking' costumes on women. It is only natural for a young wife, if she sees her husband looking for any length of time at another woman dressed in some particular way, to try and please him by emulating the style of dress she fancies he has admired."

"After all, practically every woman in the world is dressing to make herself attractive in the eyes of at least one man. Let the men cease to be lured by grotesque fashions and see with what a sigh of relief women will adopt moderation."

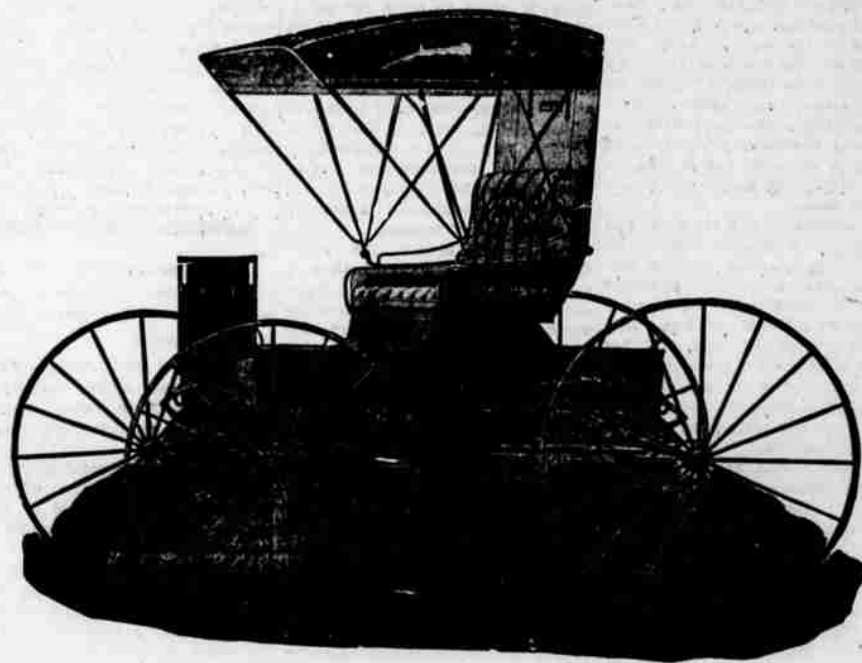

TEA LEAVES MAKE TROUBLE

Secres Tells Woman's "Fortune" and Stirs Family Row

NEW YORK, July 7.—Tea leaves and their fortune-telling properties have made things hot at the home of George Wall of Olmstead and Harmony avenues, Unionport, the Bronx. The man was a prisoner in the Morrisania court yesterday on complaint of his wife, Madeline. She accused him of non-support.

Wall told such a pathetic story of what he has suffered since Mrs. Wall began attending tea-leaf seances that Magistrate Crane discharged him. The magistrate told the Walls the best thing they could do was to go home, forget all about tea leaves and begin life over again. Every body in the court was convulsed with laughter when Wall told his story.

"Since this fortune-telling business began it has been hotter for me at home than ever it is when I am working beneath a hot-water boiler," he said. "Everything was all right in our home until my wife went to a tea party in Unionport two months ago. After the tea had been drunk the women began telling fortunes with the tea leaves. One of the women told Mrs. Wall the leaves showed he had a date that afternoon with a pretty blonde."

"When I got home from work that evening my wife was ready for me. My, wasn't she hot! She accused me of having the date with the blonde. I tried to convince her that tea

leaves knew nothing about any of my dates. She stood by the tea leaves, and finally we had a bitter quarrel."

Other tea parties followed, and the tea leaves continued to tell Mrs. Wall of legendary dates, the witness said. There was a quarrel after each tea party, and finally the court trouble came.

Magistrate Crane questioned Mrs. Wall closely. She admitted the tea leaves had made her jealous. "When I reached home last night I discovered that my husband had cleared out the furniture and that he would not let me enter the house," she said. "Then I took action against him."

Wall, who owns a pretty little home, denied that assertion. He told the magistrate the home was there and she was welcome to enter it. He said he did not purpose standing any more tea-leaf interference with his domestic happiness, however, and it must cease. The magistrate seemed to think he was right.

CONFEDERATE MONEY TAKEN.

German Shopkeepers Apparently Ignorant That Civil War Is Over.

BERLIN, July 7.—There are some merchants, hotelkeepers and cafe proprietors in Berlin who don't know the American civil war is over. Confederate money is still good with them, and a number of them in consequence are pocketing losses as the result of exchanging merchandise for "filmy," which lost its face value some 45 years ago.

The American consulate general in Berlin has lately been besieged by people who thought Uncle Sam's officials would unhesitatingly redeem some faded engravings for which good German money had in some cases been exchanged. One particular persistent applicant said his customer had so vociferously demanded the latest exchange rate for a \$100 Bank of Richmond bill that merchandise and cash had been handed out without hesitation.
