CARNEGIE FOR WORLD PEACE

PARIS, July 7.—The \$1,000,000 gift which Andrew Carnegie has made to France for rewards to heroes in peaceful pursuits is but another incident in the campaign to which the apostle of peace has devoted his life. Useful as he deems it to impress the imagination of one people after another with the perception that glory may be found not alone in war, Mr. Carnegie has in mind today a project vaster and more immediate in effect. He proposes an international conference for the purpose of limiting armaments.

The idea is not new, but the new part is the proposal that the United States shall issue a call on the ground that neutral nations cannot remain indifferent to the actions of two rival powers which lay enormous burdens on the rest of the world and threaten war in which all may be involved.

Confers With Rulers.

Mr. Carnegie is now engaged in sounding the rulers of Europe as to what reception such a call would receive. Last week he had an audience with the king of Italy, and a conference with Italian leaders. This week he saw the president of France, Premier Clemenceau and the leading senators, and now he has gone to England.

Mr. Carnegie never spoke with greater seriousness and earnestness than when he talked about his idea. "I find Europe in a ferment," he said. "The nations have gone dreadnought-mad. Italy has just decided to spend on battleships many millions of pounds which she can ill spare. Austria has embarked on the same insane program. France has resolved on no less than 38 sea monsters as necessary for her security."

Caused by Rivalry.

"All this is caused by German-British rivalry. Now, this is not merely a spectacle for us in America to marvel at. It has a direct and vital interest for us. Our country necessarily is about to be drawn into the vortex. It now has become a pertinent question whether it is permissible for any two nations to involve all the other chief nations in this mad rivalry or doom them to a practically defenseless state."

"Consider the imbecility of this course when the nations have all increased their armaments. The proposed situation will remain precisely as it was before. None will have improved its position. An increased armament can guarantee the security of no nation. It can only invite suspicion and provoke antagonisms toward that nation."

"The American correspondent of the London Times recently cabled: 'The idea of American mediation undoubtedly gains strength.'"

Remedy for Malady.

"Here is the sovereign remedy for the malady with which Europe is suffering: The United States, the greatest industrial and most peaceful nation, without prejudices or special interests, is in a position to invite the naval powers to meet in a friendly conference to endeavor to find a common ground on which to co-operate to avoid the dangers of the course which they are now pursuing."

"The first duty is to discover what nation, if any, is at fault—the one on which must rest the responsibility of menacing the peace of the world. If any power or powers should refuse to accept the invitation to meet in friendly conference, it would be clear where the responsibility must rest. If such a conference were convened, and any power should refuse to enter the league of peace, should the conference favor one, agreeing to submit to arbitration all questions arising on the sea in future and agreeing that private property be immune at sea, as it now is on land, it would then be clear where the blame must rest for continuing the present intolerable conditions."

America Obvious Agent.

"Here, I say, is probably the way out of the dangers which threaten civilization itself. The obvious agent for inflating the proposal of such a conference is my own favored republic, removed as it is from the field over which war hovers, standing outside as it does the mutual suspicions which make Europe a camp of armed men—armed not against a foreign foe, but against brother Europeans—a continent tearing itself to pieces as if one member of the body should wound another."

"Never was a holier mission entrusted to a nation than that which devolves on our republic. Even to fall in the effort to preserve the world's peace would be more glorious than to succeed in smaller issues."

"May President Taft," concluded Mr. Carnegie, "rise to the occasion and let the world know that there is one nation which stands forth willing even to fall as the champion of peace. Thus shall he at least have done his duty and placed our country in its proper position as the leader of the nations for peace on earth and among men good will."

OREGON DAY AT FAIR

It Was Observed With Fitting Ceremonies Last Friday

SEATTLE, Wash., July 8.—To-

day was Oregon day at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition. Hundreds of visitors from the neighboring state were entertained by the Portland festival chorus of 350 voices in the natural theater in the morning, a reception and lawn fete in the afternoon, and a promenade and dance in the Washington state building in the evening.

Two special trains bringing delegations from Oregon arrived yesterday, and two more came this morning. Yesterday afternoon the members of the festival chorus and their friends came to the city from Portland, and Governor Benson and his staff, together with a number of other state officials, arrived on the 4:30 train. Governor Benson responded to the address of welcome given by J. E. Chilberg, president of the exposition, this morning at 11 o'clock.

The feature display in the Oregon building was an exhibit of 1000 boxes of Valley cherries from Salem. This was the second big consignment of cherries that has been displayed in the Oregon building since the fair opened. The other shipment was brought from The Dalles for Cherry day, and was representative of the Eastern Oregon highland unirrigated variety. The latest shipment shows the quality of the valley variety. The Salem consignment is by far the largest brought to the fair during the exposition season.

Forty-five hostesses from the leading towns of the state were named for the afternoon reception from 3 to 5 o'clock, and the dance in the evening. The great majority of the hostesses are from towns other than Portland. Saturday evening, in the New York building, the hostesses will be tendered a dinner by the wives of the members of the Oregon commission.

FELL FIVE STORIES

Accident Befalls Carpenter on Portland Building

PORTLAND, July 9.—With his hand still grasping the heavy scantling over which he had tripped while working in the new Lewis building, at Fourth and Oak streets, at 3:15 o'clock yesterday afternoon, J. Bilberg, a carpenter, fell from a window on the fifth floor, striking the pavement on his head and shoulders. The sound of the man's body striking the pavement was heard over a block away and a large crowd quickly gathered.

Workmen employed in the building rushed to the man's assistance as soon as the accident happened and carried him into the toolroom, where he lay unconscious until an ambulance was summoned and he was taken to Good Samaritan hospital.

Bilberg was moving a heavy timber on the fifth floor when the accident which crushed his body and will in all probability result in his death, occurred. From others who were at work on the same floor it was learned that Bilberg was directly in front of the window and was lifting the scantling which he clung to during his fall, when he either tripped over a loose board in the incomplete flooring or lost his balance. A second afterward he plunged into the street below, striking the pavement about three feet outside of the curb.

WILD PANIC IN DETROIT STORE

DETROIT, July 10.—One child is dying and about 20 more women and children are suffering from severe injuries received in a panic in the Kress 5 and 10-cent store, on Woodward avenue, following the cry of "fire," after a scuffle between two women over a bargain on the second floor of the establishment.

About 600 women and children were swept across the floor to the stairs and jammed into a panic-stricken, screaming, fighting mob, which broke down the guard rails on one of the stairways and trampled over all who lost their footing. Many of those whose passage way to the stairs was blocked rushed to the windows and tried to jump to the street below. Fortunately, however, the warning cries of persons on the street deterred them.

One Child Dying.

Rosa Bascondi, 7 years of age, is reported dying at St. Mary's hospital from a fractured skull.

She was knocked down and trampled upon and nearly a dozen more women and children are in the same institution less seriously injured. A number were also given emergency treatment for their bruises and small cuts at the store, and went to their homes.

It was the opening day of the concern in a new location on one of the most prominent corners in the city—Woodward avenue and State street. Probably 2000 persons, principally women, were in the five-story building when the panic started.

Cry of Fire.

The excitement attracted the attention of those nearby. The onlookers pressed about them, and suddenly the cry "fire!" was heard. The hundreds of shoppers instantly became a maddened, fighting mob, rushing for the stairway at the rear of the building. They surged down the aisles and packed themselves into such a solid mass on the stairs that the guard rails gave way, precipitating several of the struggling women to the floor below. The stairway, the floor below and the second floor above became one solid mass of frightened, screaming women and children. Clothes were torn, hats were ripped off and those who were unfortunate enough to lose their footing were trampled upon.

Employees of the stores, assisted by police officers, finally convinced the crowd that the building was not on fire, and succeeded in calming them. Ambulances were summoned and the injured were hurried to hospitals.
