CRATER LAKE ROAD.

Phil Loosley, who recently returned from Crater Lake, tells that all kinds of things are doing up that way. Chief among the good things being done are the road improvements which Mr. Hodson, the Medford auto man, is putting in on the road leading to the lake. The rocks are being removed, chuck holes filled and the high places in the center of the road leveled to be out of the reach of automobiles. He is also building a bridge across Union creek.

A telephone line is being put in from Camp Arrant to the lake's water edge, a distance of six miles.

Nine thousand feet of lumber has been hauled to the rim of the lake, to be used for the floors. A camp will be established on the rim of the lake.

There is still some snow near the lake, and the road washouts, made by the melting snow, are being filled.

Four thousand pounds of freight were taken from Medford to the lake Wednesday, all of which will be used by Mr. Steel in lake improvements.

The launch which is on the lake and which has a carrying capacity of eight persons, is being repaired and fitted in fine shape for summer use. A pumping plant is being put in. Mr. Steel expects to expend from \$5000 to \$8000 in improvements about the lake this season.
