

DEMANDS SAME OTHER NATIONS

BEVERLY, Mass., Aug. 13.—President Taft and Thomas G. O'Brien, United States ambassador at Tokio, had a two-hour interview at the Taft cottage this afternoon. Fresh from Tokio, Ambassador O'Brien outlined in detail the situation in Japan as it appears to him.

He reports an extremely friendly attitude toward the United States by Japan. The interview between the president and the ambassador, while of a general nature, had particular reference to the new treaty of commerce and friendship between the two nations to take effect on the expiration of the present treaty in 1911.

After a brief trip to Europe, Mr. and Mrs. O'Brien will return to the United States for a final conference with either the president or Secretary Knox, before returning to Tokio. Mr. O'Brien will retain his post as long as Taft is president. He is credited with being as close to the throne as any ambassador to Japan.

Takahira to Stay in Japan.

"Baron Takahira will not return to the United States," says O'Brien. The general understanding in diplomatic circles is that he is to be displaced by an absolute stranger in America. This movement will be a part of Tokyo diplomacy, which aims to have a representative at Washington that is in close touch with his home government and the spirit of the people and who will not be unconsciously influenced by long association with American officials.

An intimation has already been received that Japan will insist upon the most favored nation clause in the new treaty and on a literal interpretation of the clause thereafter. That is to say, Japan will agree to live up to the "gentlemen's agreement" entered into between former Ambassador Aoki and former Secretary of State Root, whereby the empire is to prevent emigration to the United States as much as possible.

Will Demand Citizenship.

But where any Japanese subjects should desire to claim the benefits of American citizenship, Japan will insist under the most favored nation clause on the same rights in this subject for Japanese citizens as are given to the citizens or subjects of France, Germany, Italy, England, etc.

It may be said, however, that there is no belief on the part of the United States that Japan will insist upon this point except for the securing of more favorable consideration to other details of the proposed convention. It can be declared as a certainty that the United States will never agree to confer citizenship upon the Japanese, but on the other hand, it is altogether probable that President Taft will take some steps to insure to the Japanese the same privileges that are granted to other aliens residing within our borders.

Wants to Have Authority.

And, with this idea in view, the president may urge congress in his next annual message to enact such legislation as will place in the hands of the federal executive the means of enforcing the treaty rights of such aliens in the courts of the federal government.

Mr. Taft went down to defeat in the exciting golf contest at Essex courts today. This was the game that the president had set his heart on winning. With John Hays Hammond as his partner, the president was beaten again by William J. Boardman and General Adelbert Ames.

More Time in California.

It has been found that the president can remain in Los Angeles two nights instead of one when he goes to the coast, and be able to reach Grand Canyon in time to spend an entire day there. The president therefore will spend October 11 and 12 in Los Angeles, leaving that city on the morning of October 13. Mr. Taft will visit his sister in Los Angeles, which accounts for the longer stop he will make there than at some other coast cities.

GIRL IN DEN.

Esther Mitchell Was Found in a Chinaman's Hut.

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 14.—Esther Mitchell, the central figure in Seattle's Holy Roller killings of two years ago, is in the hands of the provincial police at Nanaimo, having been found, horribly emaciated and heavy with opium, in a Chinaman's shack at Departure Bay. She is held for vagrancy and will probably go to a rescue home.

In Seattle during July, 1907, her brother shot Joshua Creffield, a Holy Roller priest, whom he charged with ruining the girl. Esther, meeting her avenging brother at the Union

depot, shot him dead, allegedly being inspired thereto by Creffield's wife. She escaped punishment on the ground of temporary insanity and has since fallen lower and lower, consorting wholly with the Chinese of late, and living only to satisfy her craving for the poppy.

Esther Mitchell left Fort Stella-coom asylum, near Tacoma, where she had been confined, some months ago, without being discharged. Since that time the Washington authorities have been quietly seeking her, and she may be brought back to the asylum.

MARRIED FOR SPITE

Aged Spinster Seeks Wedlock to Protect Property

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 13.—To protect herself and her property against the designs of two men who, she alleges, are trying to gain possession of it by having her adjudged mentally incompetent, Miss Sarah J. Nichols, a wealthy woman of Hayward, yesterday married Ernest S. Smith, her protégé and the son of her former close friends. The bride is 69 years old and the bridegroom is 40.

The men who, the bride declares, have planned to get possession of her property are Fred Lucas, her half-brother, and John Collins, his brother-in-law. Smith for many years has assisted Miss Nichols in the management of her business affairs. She deeded the entire property to him five years ago, in obedience to a request of her brother, the late John Nichols, from whom she inherited a large part of her estate.

FIRE IN A GIRL'S HAT.

It Caused Quite a Commotion at a Southern Railway Station.

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 13.—A fire on the roof garden of a hat of a pretty girl traveler at the Union Station this afternoon caused two fire companies, a hose cart, a score of willing amateur firemen, delayed a fast train and destroyed \$30 worth of finery upon the peach basket.

The young woman, on her way to New York, rushed into the station for something to eat. In paying for her check she swung the hat too near the cigar lighter. In an instant the orchard which adorned her hat was a mass of flames. A dark-skinned waiter turned in a fire alarm and every available male guest tried to rescue the affair.

The train was held up a few minutes until the victim recovered from an attack of near-hysterics, when she graciously permitted it to proceed.

SHYLOCK WIELDS HIS KNIFE.

Because Santa Ana Can't Pay, Sanchez Takes Flesh.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 12.—Because Ramon Santa Ana, a laborer, could not pay a debt of 25 cents to Frank Sanchez, a fellow-laborer at Latin, the latter took half a pound of flesh from his debtor. Santa Ana came to the receiving hospital today for treatment of the mutilated arm, from which the muscle was practically stripped. The police are seeking Sanchez.

"I could not pay the two-bits," said Santa Ana to the doctors at the receiving hospital, "when he came for it yesterday, and Frank pulled a big knife from his bootleg and got me." He said:

"I'll have a pound of flesh," and he got a big piece! I don't think it is a pound, though. I tried to get away, but he was too quick for me. He made one jump with his big knife and you see what he did."

The bone of Santa Ana's left arm was barely covered with flesh, so close did his assailant come in getting Shylock's toll.

NOW SERVING TIME.

One of the Winners in Land Drawing Served Jail Sentence.

PORTLAND, Aug. 12.—Charles A. Marcy, 863 Syracuse street, was sentenced to 1681 at the Cour d'Alene Indian reservation, is serving a nine months' sentence on the rock pile at Kelly Butte for larceny. His sentence will expire in December. Marcy was able to register for the Indian lands while in jail by reason of the fact that he served in the Philippines and was, as a veteran, entitled to send a power of attorney to an agent and have the agent register for him.

MEDFORD MAN SUICIDES.

Medford friends are in receipt of information from Halfway, Oregon, to the effect that W. H. Turner, a former resident of Medford, had committed suicide at that place on August 13. He was a single man, and when he lived with his parents on West Eleventh Street. A short time after leaving here he was committed to the insane asylum at Salem and was confined there several years.

PRESIDENT TAFT WILL TOUR WEST

Remainder at Beverly with his family until September 15th the President will start on that day on a tour that will embrace all but eight or ten states of the union and both of the territories in the far northwest.

Before his departure the president made public a tentative outline of his trip through the West and South this fall. It will embrace a journey amounting to 15,000 miles and will be one of the most notable ever made by a president.

Tour Is Diverse One.

It will be as diverse as could well be imagined and no "so-called-American" tour could be devised to embrace as many points of interest in so brief a space of time as President Taft will give to his jaunt to the Pacific Coast and back through the South.

Starts on Birthday.

During the tour the President will traverse the Royal Gorge of the Rocky mountains, will visit the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition at Seattle, will see the wonderfully rebuilt San Francisco, will spend three days in the famous Yosemite valley, will stop off at the Grand Canyon of the Colorado, will greet the President of Mexico on the International bridge over the Rio Grande at El Paso on October 16th, will take a four-days' sail down the Mississippi river from St. Louis to New Orleans, with various stops enroute and will spend four days on the ranch of his brother, Charles P. Taft, near Corpus Christi, Texas.

The President will motor into Boston the morning of September 15th, his fifty-second birthday—and there board the car which practically will be a roving White House for two months.

The president's first stop will be at Chicago, where he arrives September 16th and spends the day. The last city to be visited before Washington is reached is Richmond, Va.

CANADA TO BUILD NAVY.

Imperial Government Gives Up Control of Esquimaux Yards.

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 12.—The Esquimaux navy yard will be formally taken over from the Imperial government by the Canadian government at the end of this month, and arrangements are being made by Captain Parry, R. N., and Commander Crawford, R. N., for the transfer.

Esquimaux ranks with Gibraltar and Halifax in its equipment as a naval station. The policy of the Canadian government is to build up a powerful Canadian navy.

TEHRAN HEAT IN EAST

Scores of People Are Prostrated and Several Die

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—The bodies of 40 infants, which is the greatest number to be in the morgue since the Slocum disaster, are in the morgue here today, and five adults are reported dead, in addition to scores of prostrations as the result of the intense heat which has swept the city since yesterday afternoon.

Many deaths and prostrations were reported early this morning, and with no relief in sight it is feared that the list of deaths will be greatly increased before night. Twenty-seven of the dead children died in the founding asylum and many others in the city hospitals. The suffering of the east side children is reported as terrible, and many of the children crawled through the streets, too weak to walk, seeking pools of water from the hydrants in which to lay.

It is estimated that 10,000 persons slept at Coney Island last night and all of the city parks were crowded with sleepers seeking relief from the intense heat.

Three Deaths in Chicago.

CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—Three deaths have been reported here this morning as a result of the intense heat which swept the city last night. It is slightly cooler this morning, but the weather bureau reports no probability of relief, predicting hotter weather before night.

FORMING COLONY

Adventist Farmers Are Buying Land Tract in Idaho

MOSCOW, Idaho, Aug. 12.—A large number of Adventist farmers from the Walla Walla country are buying farms at Viola, this county, a small station on the inland, north of Moscow. Elder Langdon, who is at the head of the colony, states it is the intention of his people to divide the farms into smaller tracts and to lay the foundation at this time for the manufacture of breakfast foods from products of the small farms. This colony has also submitted a proposition to the Adventist conference, now in session in Spokane, looking to the establishment of a college for this sect at Viola.

The proposed Adventist college is to be fashioned after the one at Walla Walla. In addition to preparing students for the ministry it is to include practical branches. The

Viola district is noted for its climate and the production of fruits, especially strawberries, dewberries and apples. The well-known apple orchard of Judge J. H. Forney, who was awarded prizes at the national apple show for Jonathans, is in this section. The soil is a black, sandy loam, but does not require irrigation.

SELLS HER PROPERTY

Mrs. Thaw Sacrifices Home to Further Aid Her Son

PITTSBURG, Aug. 14.—Proof that Mrs. Thaw is not yet doing fighting for her son was given yesterday when she disposed of a portion of the front lawn of famous Lyndhurst to W. W. Willock, the consideration being cash in the neighborhood of \$100,000. The property is 250x600 feet and is one of the most valuable tracts in the residence part of Pittsburgh.

Some time ago Mrs. Thaw's agent was instructed to cast about for a purchaser for half of her property in case of a sudden call. It was understood that the call would not be made if Harry K. Thaw were liberated from Matteawan. Before noon yesterday there came orders to close the deal, and Mr. Willock, who is a steel king, took up the property.

It was but recently that Mrs. Thaw borrowed \$100,000 on Lyndhurst. At the time the orders came to sell the property work was stopped on the interior of the Thaw home, which was being fitted up for the reception of Harry. At noon the workmen were all discharged.

BROKE WORLD'S RECORD

Seattle Man Put Shot a Distance of 50 Feet 20 Inches

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 14.—The annual senior championship meet of the Amateur Athletic Union, held at the exposition stadium this afternoon, gave Ralph Rose the opportunity to break the world's record for the shot-put, and it brought to the front a little Indian from Arizona, who defeated the pick of the country's five-mile runners.

Seattle carried off the first honors of the meet with a score of 46 points: the Olympia club of San Francisco, second, with a score of 36 points, and Chicago third with 26. The winners fattened their score by taking all three places in the 100-yard dash, much to the surprise of their admirers as well as of the visitors.

Rose's performance was one of the sensations of the day. Already the holder of the record at a distance of 49 feet 10 inches, he increased his throw to 50.26 feet.

Rose also secured the distinction of scoring 21 points, the greatest individual score of the meet.

In the 120-yard high hurdle, Portland, defeated Shaw of Chicago and equaled his own record, 15 1-5 seconds.

The high wind is believed to have prevented the Oregon runner from establishing a new record for the event. The most spectacular event of the day was the winning of the mile race by Harry McLean, the Indian from Phoenix, Ariz. McLean took the lead in the fourth race and set a snuffing pace.

McLean Took Lead.

E. Bellars of the New York Athletic club proved McLean's most formidable opponent, and soon took the lead away from the red man. Bellars then endeavored to slow down the pace, but the Indian forced the issue and pressed him until the shot was fired for the starting of the 20th and last lap. At this point Bellars made a brilliant burst of speed and gathered a good lead.

He could not hold it, however. McLean was at his heels at the half, and so they entered the stretch. The Indian forged ahead and crossed the tape several yards the winner. F. Jackson of Seattle, who finished third, came in a lap and a quarter behind.

BAD RAILROAD WRECK

Two Trains Are Wrecked, Several Persons Killed and Injured

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 14.—Ten persons are dead and others are expected to die and between 40 and 50 are injured; three engines are in the ditch and two baggage cars, including the contents, are smashed and several passenger coaches are badly damaged as a result of a head-on collision between the east-bound and the west-bound passenger trains on the Denver & Rio Grande railroad at Husted, 13 miles north of here, at 10:20 this morning.

The wreck was due to a misunderstanding of orders. Mistaking the engine for the second section of No. 1, the crew did not stop, and the crew went through Husted as fast as two engines could draw the 12 heavily loaded cars.

As soon as the train got out of the station, the engineer on the first engine of the east-bound train saw another train slowly coming down the incline. He slammed on the emergency brakes and then shouted to the other members of the two crews to jump. Before they had time to jump the east-bound had rammed the west-bound so hard that all three engines lay in the ditch.

were in the same car. A relief train with physicians and nurses was sent to the scene from this city.

The dead and injured were brought here on a special train and on the regular west-bound about noon. Both trains were heavily loaded, the east-bound carrying many tourists and members of the G. A. R. returning from Salt Lake.

The coroner has called an inquest over the wrecked victims for Monday.
