SALOONS ARE HIT AGAIN.

New York Sporting Men Drink Buttermilk.

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—Makers and dispensers of intoxicating liquors now have a new worry besides the worry of the prohibition party and other reform elements. The regular drinkers of "hard liquor" have suddenly developed a preference for buttermilk. They find it gratifies and satisfies and does not inebriate.

To such an extent has this beverage taken hold upon the drinking public that it now takes all of one man's time in the Waldorf-Astoria to carry jars of buttermilk from the cellar to the bar.

Fifty quarts is below the daily average consumption at the Hotel Knickerbocker bar. Browne's chop house has put in an immense porcelain churn to keep buttermilk handy for devotees of the Rialto. Three to four hundred drinks of it in the daily average consumed by the sporting element which frequent the Union cafe in Broadway and Bourne, and other saloons in the financial district sell more buttermilk than malt liquors.

TOWNSEND VISITS SALEM.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 14.—B. D. Townsend, assistant United States attorney, is here preparing the government's brief in the case of the United States vs. the Oregon & California Railroad company—the famous land grant cases.

He is making his headquarters at the office of the attorney-general at the state house, and is accompanied by his stenographer, Mr. Griffith.

WILL INCREASE THE DELEGATION

Oregon will have three, and possibly four, members of the lower house of Congress after the next census is the prediction of Congressman Hawley, who has just returned from Washington, where he has been attending the eight months' session. Mr. Hawley said:

"So far as I may have anything to do with the census, I want to see it very thorough and complete in every town and county in the district. On the result of the census depends Oregon's representation in the lower house for the next ten years. We will have three, and, I hope, four members after the census is completed. It is no small task for two men to look after the needs of a great state like this in congress, and the larger our representation the better it will be for all concerned."

LIKES TARIFF BILL.

"I regard the tariff bill as a very good measure. I think the country will find that it makes a genuine revision downward and that the consumer will get the benefit of lower prices."

"That portion of Oregon's civil war claim which has been passed on by the court of claims, amounting to about \$192,000, I hope will be paid within another year. I have a bill pending for that purpose."

"During the summer I am going to try to get over a good part of my district. I desire especially to visit those sections of the state where there are forest reserves and irrigation and waterpower projects. I am heartily in favor of throwing open to settlement all the available agricultural land in the reserves. The department has found the settlers the best and most vigilant help it can get in protecting timber from fire, and for this and other reasons I want to see all the land in the reserves fit for farming in the hands of actual settlers. There is some controversy in Southern Oregon between the holders of mining claims and timber claims, and I am going to try to visit that part of the state and also the Siletz country this summer."

Oregon City Locks.

"I have a bill pending to acquire the locks at Oregon City, and in view of the fact that Oregon has shown a disposition to do its full share in this transaction I am very confident that the federal government will be willing to take hold of the matter."

TWO BROTHERS DIED.

It Happened Under Very Peculiar Circumstances at Victoria, B. C.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 17.—James and William Mortimore, tailors, died last night under strange circumstances. They were bachelors and lived together. Last night James complained of a pain in his side and went to the basement for hot water. He did not return and William went to investigate. He found James lying dead. After assisting the housekeeper to remove the body, William complained of feeling badly and on lying down he died before a doctor could be summoned. Both died of heart failure.

LADY MADE SALE.

The Wife of A. E. Woolverton Sold Lot in Woolverton Addition.

Mrs. A. E. Woolverton was quite the proudest woman in Medford last night. Yesterday she sold a residence lot in Woolverton's addition to Medford to William B. Shively, recently from San Diego, Cal. The price paid was \$375. This was Mrs. Woolverton's first sale—in fact the first sale ever made of real estate in Medford by a woman—and she has reason to be proud. Mr. Shively will at once build a bungalow on the lot. His family is here with him.

He placed a ladder against a tree, climbed up and swung off to death. Hale was 77 years old and reported rich. For the past 25 years he has lived alone on a ranch, having parted from his wife, who lives in Albany.
