Sad Mishap of Child of Mr. and Mrs. H. O. Wilkinson

One of the prettiest and healthiest little children in Medford was the year and a half old child of Mr. and Mrs. H. O. Wilkinson, and she was a great favorite around where the family lived at 123 North Ivy street. A few weeks ago the family went to Seattle on a visit, and now comes the news from there that the child fell into some boiling water, and the result has been that she had to have both arms amputated at the elbows. It appears that Mrs. Wilkinson left the child with relatives near Seattle while she went to the city. While left alone to amuse herself, the child crawled in the kitchen and stuck her arms into a pot of boiling water. Her piercing screams brought the members of the family in the house and everything possible was done, but the physicians who called found that the only hope of saving the child's life was to amputate both of its arms, and this was done as soon as possible.

Mr. Wilkinson until recently was the proprietor of a saloon on D street, known as "Weary's." A few weeks ago he failed, owing a considerable sum to two breweries, and they bought in the business at a sheriff's sale a few days ago. Mr. Wilkinson has been in poor health for some time and was not in a condition to attend to his business. Personally he was well liked and popular and has many friends in this city who will be sorry to hear of his latest misfortune.

FIGHT IS GOING MERRILY ALONG

The fight in connection with the proposed Oregon Central railway goes merrily on, and the end is not yet. As far as the Hill connection with the Pacific & Eastern railway is concerned, it can be stated that yesterday Auditor Turner, of the President Allen firm, of the P. & E., whose offices are in New York City, arrived in Medford yesterday and soon after proceeded to the depot and took the morning train on that road for Butte Falls.

So far President Allen has failed to arrive, but according to all reports he is expected here almost any time. In fact, it has been learned on the best authority that he will be here this week. Just what will transpire after he comes is hard to tell, but it appears from all indications that there will likely be something doing in the railway business in this vicinity in the near future.

The following regarding the matter is from a Portland paper:

Get Out of Way.

"Get out of the way and let a man have the path who can run," said the frightened individual as he overtook a fleet deer on the trail.

"Get out of the way and let a company have right of way which can build a railroad," says W. W. Cotton to his Deschutes opponents. But no intimation is made that Mr. Cotton or his people are frightened. They want to build a railway into Central Oregon. They are pleading with the federal court to give them a clear way. The construction fever is pulsing through their veins. "Let us get at our work, let us build a railroad, regardless of what the other fellow does," is the burden of the petition that closed the five-hour argument Mr. Cotton made before Judge Bean yesterday afternoon.

It was a heart-gladdening hour. Even a dull fancy could see looming over the courtroom the beaming face of Central Oregon. Years of weariness and waiting were suddenly transformed into joy, a land of prayer and petition had changed to one of brilliant promise, and the hundreds of thousands who are now to enter that region for residence seemed to march by in festive frolic.

Engineer John F. Stevens.

John F. Stevens has said that he would build a railway into that region, which Judge C. H. Carey reiterates. It is serious, constructive work that the attorneys for Mr. Stevens and Mr. Hill asked the court to consider, and urged that they be not held in the light of men who sought merely to embarrass and delay.

Mr. Cotton consumed all of yesterday in his presentation of the reasons why the restraining order should be withdrawn, for the 12 miles in conflict in the 60-mile southern reach of the Oregon Trunk right of way. His argument wandered to the merits of the case throughout the Deschutes canyon. Most that he said yesterday will apply to the suit over the north 40 miles of the Oregon Trunk right of way. Briefly, he contended as follows:

That the Oregon Trunk did not complete its organization until after the date that its surveys were alleged to have been made and approved by the interior department, hence no right or title whatever vested in the company as a result of this preliminary work.

Was No Survey.

That the promoters of the company never made a survey of the line until it was purchased by Porter Bros., that the affidavits accompanying the maps filed with the interior department are false and fraudulent, and that the survey of record in the interior department was not based upon any actual work by the Oregon Trunk officials in the canyon, and hence is loose, inaccurate and impossible of construction.

Mr. Cotton said: "We are honestly and earnestly trying to build a railway, trying to build that railway up the east side of the Deschutes river, through the points in controversy. We don't care whether the other gentlemen build a railway, don't care whether they build today or tomorrow, or when, but we do object to the use of fraudulent maps to secure rights which we have lawfully acquired."

SUIT FOR \$20,500

John Harrington Adds Another Chapter to Well-known Case

John Harrington of this city has started suit against County Judge Neil, Mrs. Victor Snyder and Lawyer W. B. Phipps for the sum of \$20,500 for false imprisonment and attorney fees in the case of the suit of Mrs. Snyder against John Harrington.

The attorney for Mrs. Snyder was W. B. Phipps and the attorneys for Harrington were Robert G. Smith of Grants Pass and Herbert E. Hanna of Jacksonville. The case was tried before County Judge Neil and Mr. Harrington was committed to jail until the Supreme court reversed the decision and he was liberated. Later on he was allowed to resume his business.

The claim is made that Harrington had turned over all the property in dispute to the sheriff. This was refused until after Mr. Harrington had been committed to jail, when it is alleged that the opposition took possession of the property. The sum of \$20,000 is asked for as damages and the sum of \$500 attorney's fees.

It is understood that another action will be begun as an outcome of the case in the near future.

EDWARD TRYER.

Edward Tryer was born in Lowell, Henry county, Iowa, March 21, 1872. When a boy he moved with his parents to California, from which state he moved to this city in 1877, where he lived with his parents until grown to manhood. After living in Medford several years he moved to Seattle, Wash. From Seattle he again returned to Medford, where he lived several months, when he moved to Grants Pass, in Josephine county, Oregon, where, after a short illness, he died of abscess of the brain on August 17, 1909.

Mr. Tryer leaves to mourn his loss a sorrowing wife, two daughters, Edna and Ramoh Tryer, besides an aged mother, and the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. Annie Schreyer, living in Kansas City, Kan.; Marion Tryer of this city; Lydia Schreyer, Tacoma, Wash.; Samuel Tryer, Kennett, Cal., and Mrs. R. H. Toft, also of this city. Funeral services were held at the home of his sister, Mrs. R. H. Toft, in this city, August 19, conducted by C. H. Hoxie.

MYSTERY UNFOLDED

Part of Skeleton Found Believed to Be That of William King

It appears that Mr. King was occupying a cabin at the head of Trail creek, and when last seen was at the residence of Mr. Ragsdale.

There was considerable talk caused at the time, as it was known that Mr. King had quite a sum of money on him at the time. Coroner Kellogg and Ed King went out and investigated the report that the remains had been found. They came across human bones and a skull. These were brought to Medford and every effort will be made to see if they can be identified.
