MOCK CRUCIFIXION.

Omaha Ministers Object to Executions on Friday.

OMAHA, Sept. 25.—Because Judge Sutton of Douglas county district court departed from the old customs of fixing Friday as a date for executions, in sentencing John Ma-sourides, murderer of a South Omaha police officer, to be hanged on a Monday, the Omaha Ministerial union yesterday adopted a resolution commending the judge. Speaking of fixing the date for the execution on Monday instead of Friday, Judge Sutton said:

"The execution of murderers on Friday always has been abhorrent to me. It is a custom dating back into antiquity and nothing less than a mockery of the crucifixion of Christ. Although this may be sentiment, it seems to me, with five other days in the week on which to vindicate law and justice, there is no necessity of confining an execution to the day upon which the Savior gave up his life."

Never before so far as known has a man been sentenced in Nebraska to be hanged on any other day than Friday.

DR. COOK REFUSES.

Will Let Copenhagen University Have First Examination.

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—Dr. Cook's refusal to submit his observations, notes and other data at once to a competent scientists' committee is all that stands in the way of a compliance with a suggestion of the National Geographical society today that such a step, in justice to both Cook and Peary, should precede any official recognition of the explorer's claim.

The correspondence made public tonight shows Peary has already formally signified his willingness to comply with the conditions, but Cook has declared he will continue in his determination to lay all his records and instruments first before the University of Copenhagen.

BROKE AIR FLIGHT RECORD

Wright Reaches Elevation of Sixteen Hundred Feet

POTTSDAM, Pa., Oct. 2.—Orville Wright today broke his own and all other records for high flying. He reached the unprecedented height of more than 1600 feet, although official measurement was not taken. Wright took Crown Prince Frederick for a ten-minute flight today, ascending to a height of 60 feet. During Wright's high flight, while

the machine was at its greatest altitude, excursionists on a naval steamer three miles distant thought it a big box kite and were surprised when further evolutions showed the object to be Wright's aeroplane. When he returned to earth Wright, in speaking of the marvelous flight, said:

"I never flew so high before. No measurement was taken, but estimate I reached an altitude of 500 meters. It is difficult to gauge the height, but I make the estimate from the time it took me from the starting point to attain the greatest altitude. After rising I set the rudder at the maximum and kept climbing steadily for 15 minutes. The descent was made in five minutes. I came down to terra firma in fine shape."

"The whole machine shook as it rushed through the air, but my sensations were just the same as in lower altitudes. The air was no colder and the wind resistance no greater."

W. H. PARKER DEAD

Former Well-known Attorney of Jackson County

The sad news was received in Medford yesterday of the death of Attorney W. H. Parker, which occurred in Oakland, California, Friday night.

Mr. Parker was one of the pioneers of Jackson county. He taught school in the county a number of years, and was elected twice to the office of county clerk. He moved to Medford a few years after completing his terms of office from a farm which he owned near Jacksonville. For several years he resided in this city and practiced law here.

While here he edited and had printed an index, or key, to the Oregon laws, and today there are few, if any, law offices in the state which has not on its shelves a copy of this work. He stood high among the lawyers of the state and was considered one of the best authorities in the state on law points.

Deceased left Medford several years ago with his family for Oakland, California, where he has since resided. He was 65 years of age.

His son, Joseph Parker, who is Southern Pacific agent in Medford, and his family left yesterday for Oakland to attend the funeral. Mr. Parker had been with his father several years prior to his death, and when he left him Friday he was seemingly much improved.

MINING CONGRESS.

Takes Action on Several Matters—Tabooes Dr. Cook.

GOLDFIELD, Nev., Sept. 30.—The American Mining Congress devoted today's sessions to receiving reports from special committees, revising the Alaska mining laws, adopting resolutions endorsing Roosevelt's policy of conservation of natural resources, and urged the creation of an interior waterways commission.

The congress refused to recognize Dr. Cook as the discoverer of the North Pole on the ground it had neither evidence that Cook had discovered the pole, nor was it competent to consider such evidence.

The principal address of the day was a speech by David Ross, harbor commissioner of Illinois.
