TO QUELL OUTLAWRY.

Stockmen in Eastern Oregon Will Try to Stop Rustling.

VALE, Or., Oct. 14.—A large, organized band of horse thieves has been operating over a wide area in Central Oregon for several years. Its work in all instances was systematic. The drives were made at night over routes away from habitations, and the men who were suspected, who have since left the country, would be in town during the evening, and show up again in the morning to divert suspicion.

The great horse heaven of Oregon is at Wagonite mountain, on the border line of Crook and Harney counties, 65 miles southwest of Burns and 100 miles north of Lakeview, where there are at present 1500 horses. The owners of these animals have become aroused over frequent raids of the gang, and for several months have been gathering evidence.

Members in Three States. W. Z. Moss of Warner lake, a horse breeder whose stock has been raided several times, is co-operating with the owners. They have found that the gang has members in Crook, Harney and Malheur counties in Oregon, and in Canyon county, in Idaho and Humboldt county, in Nevada.

One man has been placed under arrest at Burns, and other alleged members of the gang will be arrested in the near future. Three prominent men have left the country since the investigation started. One of them told a friend that if he was caught he would tell a story that would cause the greatest shake-up in the annals of the Oregon range.

SCHOOL NOTES.

Ashland College Preparatory and Business Institution.

As soon as the text books arrive the mechanical drawing will begin.

The third student from Coos county will enter in November.

The leading magazines published are on the tables for the use of the students.

The commendable feature of our business course is the practical way in which it is taught.

At the students' reception Friday evening of this week at the school building, there will be a short program, amusements and a general social time.

The football team, under the management of Ed Vincent, is getting in some good practice. The team will meet on the gridiron with the Medford high school team on Saturday, October 23.

TERRIBLE STORM IN SOUTH.

Towns Almost Wholly Destroyed and Lives Lost.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 15.—At least 37 persons were killed in a storm that swept portions of Tennessee, Alabama, Arkansas and South Carolina yesterday. From reports received tonight the death list will likely reach 50. The property loss is estimated at a million dollars.

The devastation is widespread, whole towns being razed.

Apportionment of Dead.

The apportionment of the known dead is as follows:

In Tennessee—At Denmark, Mulberry, Stanton, one each; at Pittsburg Landing, seven; Stanleyville, eight; Nixon, five.

In Georgia—Near Cartersville, one.

In Alabama—At Scottsboro, three; Wyeth Cove, eight; near Scottsboro, one.

Near Marmaduke, Ark., one. Unconfirmed reports say there are 13 dead at Stauntonville, Tenn.

Fire Completes Destruction.

The situation at Denmark, Ark., is aggravated by a fire which consumed the few dwellings and stores left by the storm. Two hundred people have applied for aid. McNairy county reports heavy damage.

Many statues in the National Park on the battlefield of Shiloh were torn from their pedestals and the property damage is estimated at \$100,000.

Russellville, Ala., reports four seriously injured.

NOT TO CALIFORNIA.

Hill Says He Will Not Invaade Harriman Territory.

ST. PAUL, Oct. 13.—J. J. Hill today denied that the Great Northern railway is trying to enter Harriman territory in California by extending the Oregon Trunk railway to San Francisco. He also denied that during his visit to New York there had been a conference of railway magnates attended by his and Morgan and by Harriman and Hawley representatives. The stories published on the Pacific coast that the Oregon Trunk proposes to build into San Francisco are emphatically denied.

"All the building is to be done in Oregon," said he. "There is plenty of room for feeders in that state and the mileage which we expect to add to our system will be confined to that state. We have no intention of entering California."

PITTSBURG WINS CHAMPIONSHIP

DETROIT, Oct. 16.—Pittsburg won the world's baseball championship today by defeating Detroit by the overwhelming score of 8 to 0 in the seventh and decisive game of one of the greatest battles ever fought for the world's title. This gives the National league champions the victory by a count of four games to three. It is the third successive victory of the American league champions and consequently the third straight victory for the National league.

To Charles Adams, the phenomenal young pitcher from Louisville, belongs the lion's share of credit for the victory and his wonderful pitching has crowded Wagner, Leach, Clarke and other Pittsburg stars into the background.

Adams' Great Work.

Today's game was his third of the series, and he held Detroit safely throughout the game. He allowed but six hits and in only one inning—the fourth—did Detroit get more than one safety. Adams allowed only one base on balls, and in four innings retired the hard-hitting American leaguers in one-two-three order.

Two twirlers upon whom Detroit had pinned faith in winning the series were lacking when the critical time came. "Wild Bill" Donovan lived up to his nickname by passing six batters and hitting another in the first two innings. While this lack of control allowed Pittsburg to score only two runs, it had a bad effect on the Detroit defense, and Pittsburg scored often after then.

Donovan Relieved.

Donovan let in a two-bagger and a single in the third, but a snappy double play stopped Pittsburg from scoring.

George Mullin was sent in to bat for Donovan in the third and two up, pitching after that. The Detroit man was unequal to the task of pitching four games of seven and was easy for the Pittsburgh batters after Donovan had given them their start.

The play was fierce in the early innings, but Detroit grew discouraged as inning after inning went by and it could not score on Adams, while Mullin was helpless in holding the National league champions.

Two Injured.

Robert Byrne and George Moriarity were injured in a collision at first base in the first inning and both were forced to leave the game, although Moriarity remained until he had hit a two-bagger in the second.

Pittsburg Wild With Delight.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Oct. 16.—Pandemonium reigned here tonight. Pittsburg was turned over to baseball enthusiasts, who wildly celebrated the victory of the Pittsburg team today. Baseball fans, headed by brass bands, marched about the streets cheering like mad men. Streetcar traffic was practically abandoned. Mayor Magee tonight issued a proclamation welcoming the Pittsburg club home and calling on the people to decorate the city. A monster parade and celebration will be held Monday night.

HIGH TRACTION ENGINE.

Orchard Home Company Places Order for 40-Horse Machine.

The Orchard Home company of Tolo has ordered a new 1910 model traction engine, catapillar type, of 40-horsepower, and it will arrive there in the near future.

The engine will pull a nine-sheave plow, each sheave to be 14 inches in diameter, and the gang plow will cut or turn a 10 1/2-foot swath. Behind this will come a revolving harrow that pulverizes the dirt.

The machine can be run 24 hours if necessary, and will have a capacity of 20 acres every 10 hours.

The machine will be used for the cultivation of the orchards and is the largest one in Southern Oregon.

SUICIDE AT ASHLAND.

Unknown Man Shoots Himself Through the Head.

Word was received here yesterday of the suicide of a man at Ashland whose identity, up to late hour last evening, had not been established. He shot himself through the head. He is a stranger in Ashland. Indications are that he was a rover rather than a laboring man. He was well dressed and had a gold watch and \$50 in his pockets. He was about 30 years old, had dark hair, light blue eyes and was five feet eight inches tall.

There were no letters or papers or other marks about his clothing by which he might be identified.

POSSIBLE COMPROMISE.

It is possible the legal controversy between the city of Medford and M. F. Hanley will be settled without further litigation. The proposition of a compromise has again been mooted and the defendant is alleged to be willing to enter into negotiations. Such a disposition of the case would be highly agreeable to the citizens of Medford.
