## FINE BANK SHOWING.

The banks of Medford are to be congratulated upon the wonderful showing made in their reports after practically six weeks of financial stringency in the country, with exchange from the east cut off.

It is doubtful if any banks of the country can make a better showing. For any bank to have practically 50 per cent of its deposits in cash in vaults and with approved reserve agents when but 15 per cent is required by law is little less than marvellous, when the drain upon banks by frightened depositors is considered.

All of Medford's banks are as sound as they make them, and they are but an index of the prosperity of the city, county and state.

## GUARANTEE BANKERS JUGGED THE FUNDS

Plain evidence that the officials of the Title Guarantee & Trust company juggled the funds of the institution and then took the cash out of the general deposits to cover a large shortage in the trust funds of the bank is shown by the statement of S. C. Spencer, who gathered his evidence from the books of the bank.

The bank closed its doors October 29. The receiver was appointed November 6. The day previous, November 5, the books of the bank showed that John P. Shields, second trust officer of the bank, was charged with \$15,000 in cash, \$5000 in drafts, a check for \$50,000 drawn by the Title Guarantee & Trust company in favor of Shields. Shields has now said that he deposited the \$5000 in drafts and the check for \$30,000 in the bank of Ladd & Tilton in his own name. The \$15,000 in cash was afterwards turned over to Receiver Hill so Shields says, by check written by Shields.

## FINE APPLES SHIPPED TO SIBERIAN SEAPORT

About the finest display of apples ever seen in any city is on exhibition at the store of Goddard-Kelly company, Washington and Sixth streets, says the Portland Journal. The display is made by D. S. Yodjoglon, of Yodjoglon brothers of Vladivostok, Siberia.

The fruit is from the Hood River district and is the pick of the world's best apples. It includes the Winter Banana, Ben Davis, Orley, B-A Chest Pippin and several other varieties for which Oregon is famous as a producer.

The pack out of this state—and this means the world—for Oregon apples have the reputation everywhere for being the best packed. The display is under the direct supervision of Mr. Yodjoglon. The windows are decorated with American, Russian and English flags.

## ANOTHER CREAMERY FOR SOUTHERN OREGON

The dairy business is rapidly enlarging throughout Oregon and this part of the state is sharing in the exploitation of this industry.

Creameries are in successful operation at Medford and Central Point, in this county, and another on Applegate, Josephine county, assists in supplying the demand in this section for good butter.

According to the Herald, E. E. Brewster, who has resigned his position with the Central Point creamery with J. D. Graham & Sons will engage in the creamery business at Williams, Josephine county, under the firm name of the Graham-Brewster Cream company. The firm has leased a fine dairy ranch comprising several hundred acres and expects to handle from 75 to 100 cows of their own right along. The building for the plant is now under course of construction and the machinery has been ordered from the east. They expect to have the plant running within a few weeks.

## NO SECURITY GIVEN FOR STATE OF OREGON'S DEPOSITS

That the \$1,000,000 of banking timber securities transferred by the Title Guarantee & Trust company in its last days to State Treasurer George Steel will be returned to the bank depositors in that institution and that the American Surety company will be held to reimburse the state for its losses is now almost certain.

In a hearing before United States Judge Wolverton on petitions for removal of Receiver George H. Hill and appointment of a new receiver, the Title Guarantee & Trust company's attorneys, Joseph Simon, declared the transfer to have been reprehensible and unlawful.
