UNION PACIFIC RAILROAD RESUMES ROAD BUILDING

OMAHA, Dec. 7.—Positive announcement was made today by General Manager Mohler that the Union Pacific is resuming construction work. When the banks shut down on cash payments five weeks ago the Union Pacific was quick to follow with the announcement that practically all of the big work then under way, including the double tracking of its main line, construction of several important cut-offs in Nebraska, Kansas and Colorado, the building of several new branches or extensions, was to be stopped entirely because of inability to secure cash to pay for labor or material.

This order emanated from President Harriman in New York and affected all parts of the Harriman system. For ten days rumors have been current that this order had been revoked and that thousands of men were being re-employed.
