**ORCHARD TESTIMONY IN PETTIBONE TRIAL**

BOISE, Dec. 16.—Clarence Darrow is ill and unable to be in court today, and the asking of impeaching questions of Orchard was postponed until tomorrow, when it is assumed that Darrow will again be present. Orchard was again called to the stand, however, and Wilson, for the defense, asked if Pettibone was present in Idaho when Stennsburg was killed. On receiving a negative reply, Wilson moved that Orchard's testimony regard crimes alleged to have been committed in Colorado be stricken from the record because they did not tend to connect the defendant with the crime charged. He also asked that the same be done with the testimony regarding the Cour d'Alene riots. The motion was overruled and Orchard excused. Judge Goddard of the supreme court of Colorado testified as to the finding of bomb placed near Pettibone's residence in company of General Wells, J. P. Pender, detective, of Ogden, testified as to the arrest of Steve Adams, and a man named Wilson at that place in 1903 and of Adams sending a message to Haywood asking for \$75. H. C. Snyder, the city jailer at Ogden, corroborated this statement, and George W. Rich, a hotel keeper at Pocatello, testified that in 1903 a man registering as J. Ward, afterwards identified as Adams, stopped at his house. Objection was then made to this testimony, and Judge Wood reserved his decision pending the investigation of the record to see whether Orchard had testified he told Pettibone of Adams being in Pocatello to blow up a trainload of non-union workmen. Charles E. Baldwin then testified as to the movements of Lyle Gregory the night he was killed, after which the court adjourned until 2 o'clock.

**BUSINESS CONDITIONS NORMAL IN PORTLAND**

PORTLAND, Or., Dec. 16.—With the conclusion of the holiday period today the Portland banks have formally resumed currency payments. Although they have been to all intents and purposes on a specie basis for the past ten days, there was no run on any of the banks and the reopening of the public offices and courts for business was marked by no unusual incidents.

**Mine Disaster in Alabama.**

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Dec. 16.—An explosion, possibly of gas, took place in No. 1 mine of the Yalanda Coal & Coke company at Yalanda, 35 miles from Birmingham today. Ninety men

reported for work. An hour after the explosion 14 men had crawled from the mine, all burned. Reports from the scene of the explosion vary as to the number of men in the mine and whether they will be dead. The number is placed at between 60 and 70, while the officials of the mine hope against the worst. Little hope is expressed that many will get out alive. A message from Yalanda at 2 o'clock says that 17 men have been taken out alive.
