PUT OUT POISON TO KILL COYOTES

When the state organization of wool growers met in annual convention at The Dalles and adopted a resolution to take steps to destroy the coyote it met legal questions as to the method of killing them. At that time the discussion tended to show that poisoning was the only successful method. In the poisoning of the pests on the range the risk is incurred of killing domestic animals, especially dogs. Whether or not

the sheepman will lay himself criminally or civilly liable is embodied in a report made to the committee of the association by Attorney Charles H. Carter. As the movement for the destruction of the animals is intended to be state wide, the officers of the association are moving with caution. Mr. Carter's opinion will be published in pamphlet form, together with the articles on coyote extermination, now in preparation by the committee.

GOVERNMENT TO STOP KLAMATH PROJECT WORK

On account of wet weather the government will shut down its work in the Klamath country in about two weeks. The work for the Keno canal, now carrying on, is on a side hill and the snows and rains of the past week have made the hill very slippery, making work with teams very difficult and hard on the horses.

A POPULAR YOUNG MAN DIES SUDDENLY

Word has been received of the death of Charles Thomas Warner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Warner of Oregon. Young Warner died in the hospital at Kennet, Cal., where he was assistant engineer for the Mammoth Copper Mip

ing company. The body was shipped home for interment.

Mr. Warner was born at Stockton, Cal., August 20, 1888, and came to Oregon City with his parents in the age of 9 years. He attended the public schools of that place, graduating from the Tarelay high school, after which he entered the University of Oregon, taking a course in mining engineering and was graduated last June. He plunged at once into his chosen field and worked for the Opp mine, near Jacksonville, one of the largest in southern Oregon.

Residing with parents, he is survived by two sisters. He was a young man of much promise and many friends mourn his untimely death.
