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ASHLAND GOES DRY.

Ashland has voted for prohibition
and will be dry for the next year.

This is a matter that concerns Ashland only, and no one outside of Ashland cares. But Ashland, not content with regulating its own affairs, will try and regulate those of all other county communities. Having voted for self dry, Ashland will try to vote Jackson county dry.

It is an unfortunate feature of Oregon's local option law that it so entitles that any district can go "wet" and yet if the county goes dry, the district must also go dry, irrespective of its vote and wishes.

There are many reasons why Ashland should vote for prohibition. It is a school town and not a busy town and has no ambition to be. Perhaps no stronger argument could be used than that put forth in the circular issued by the prohibitionists, which state:

"What advantages does Ashland offer? We may as well be absolutely candid. Ashland is not a commercial city; she has no large factories—no extensive mines. The railroad has a good payroll, but no prospect of its employing a largely increased force. Ashland does not appeal to the laborer, but to the householder and the fruit grower."

THE CITY ELECTION.

If those councilmen whose consciences compel them to seek ways and means

of ousting Mayor Reddy are in earnest, the matter is a simple one to straighten out. In a few hours they can find out just where they stand legally and can save much needless discord and such wrangling.

The election call has been issued without calling for the election of a mayor. Mandamus proceedings can at once be begun to compel the council to call for the election of a mayor and the legality of the proceedings be determined at once. This is a far better plan than to elect another mayor.

Then a legal contest would ensue between the two mayors for possession of the office, and while they were fighting it out in the courts, all business for the city council would be at a standstill.

The best interests of the city demand that, if a fight is to be made over the office, it be made before the election.
