A week has now gone by since the
bank holidays in Oregon ended, and
the result has proved the needlessness
of the holidays.

In Medford all three banks report
an increase in deposits during the week,
practically no money has been with-
drawn.

and has never been the slightest cause
for alarm or for a stringency, and this
fact is being universally recognized by
both bankers and the public.

ORDINANCE NO. 134.

An ordinance making the annual tax
levy for the City of Medford, Oregon,
and the Medford Road District, for
the year 1907.

The people of the city of Medford do
ordain as follows:
Section 1. There shall be levied for
the year 1907 the following taxes upon
the assessed valuation of all taxable
property in the city of Medford, Ore-
gon, as shown by the assessment roll
for Jackson county, Oregon, for the
year 1907, for the following purposes,
to-wit:

For city purposes, four mills on the

dollar;
For public purposes, one-half mill on
the dollar;

For general sewer fund purposes, two
mills on the dollar;

For street light purposes, one-half
mill on the dollar;

For debt fund for payment of interest
on city debt, four mills on the dol-
lar;

For street and road purposes, three
mills on the dollar;

The levy for street and road pur-
poses shall be levied upon all of the
taxable property in the city of Med-
ford and in the Medford Road District.

Section 2. It is hereby made the duty
of the city recorder to certify to the
county clerk of Jackson county, Ore-
gon, the levy made by this ordinance.

The foregoing ordinance was passed
by the city council the 13th day of
December, 1907, by the following vote:
Effect affirmative, Trumble, aye, Hafer,
and Barbell, absent.

of December, 1907.

ORDINANCE NO. 135.

An ordinance prescribing the duties and
fixing the compensation of the City
Recorder of the City of Medford, Ore-
gon.

The people of the city of Medford do
ordain as follows:

Section 1. The city recorder of the
city of Medford, Oregon, shall perform
such duties as are required of him by
the charter of the city of Medford, and
such other duties as the city council
may from time to time prescribe in
addition thereto.

Section 2. The city recorder shall
receive as full compensation for all
services rendered by him to said city
the sum of one hundred dollars per
month, payable as other bills of said
city are paid.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take
effect upon the third Tuesday in Janu-
ary, 1908.

Section 4. Ordinance No. 143 and
all other ordinances and parts of or-
diances in conflict herewith are here-
by repealed.

The foregoing ordinance was passed
by the council December 13, 1907, with
the following vote: aye, Trumble, aye,
Hafer, absent.
