MONSTER MERGER

OF UNION LABOR

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—Plans are complete for the formation of a temporary organization which will embrace all the building trades unions in the country in accordance with an appeal made at the last annual meeting of the American Federation of Labor. A charter for the new organization will be asked for at the next meeting of the executive council of the federation, which will be held in New York on January 20.

A meeting to form permanent organization will be held January 9. The new federation, it is said, will include 1,000,000 members.

CHRISTIA SCIENTISTS

HAVE GREAT PLAN

BOSTON, Dec. 23.—A Christian Science institution to cost \$1,000,000, to poor, is the latest of the projects to be devoted especially to helping the poor, is the latest project of the church. The Weekly Sentinel, the official organ of the Christian Science church, contains a letter from Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy, the leader of the Christian Science faith, in which she says: "I desire to commence immediately to found a Christian Science institution for the special benefit of the poor and general good of all mankind. The founding and endowment of this institution will cost at least \$1,000,000."

Carter's scheme to defraud the United States government in connection with the harbor improvements at Savannah, Ga.

OREGON SENATORS

ON GOOG COMMITTEES

In the new alignment of senate committees for the sixtieth congress, northwestern senators and particularly those from Oregon, fared exceedingly well.

Senator Fulton retains his chairmanship of claims, which is one of the more important committees of the senate and has places on expenditures in the treasury department, industrial expositions, judiciary, public lands and revision of laws. Although he gave up military affairs, his place is going to La Follette, it is placed to enlarge this committee and again make him a member.

Senator Bourne is pleased with his assignments. He is made chairman of fisheries, which is an active working committee, and has places on coast defenses, expenditures in the department of justice, postoffices and postroads, public health and railroads.

PETTIBONE'S TRIAL

IS DELAYED SOMEWHAT

BOISE, Idaho, Dec. 23.—Owing to the failure of one of the witnesses for the state to arrive, only a brief session of the Pettibone trial was held today and adjournment was taken until tonight, when the prosecution will rest, and the motion of the defense for the court to direct a verdict of not guilty will be argued.

INCREASES IN PENSIONS

ASKED FOR BY HAWLEY

Representative Hawley has introduced bills increasing the pensions of Samuel Hawkins, Battie E. Wheeler, Helen M. Silsby, William Chittenden, Garrett P. Atchison, Salisbury Sherman, William S. Winsor and Mary Brantner. Also bills granting pensions to Mary Haney and Luman O. Judd.

He also presented to the house of representatives the following memorials of the Oregon state legislature: House joint memorial No. 5, favoring legislation for the relief of settlers on unsurveyed lands; senate joint resolution favoring the pensioning of veterans of the Bannock war; senate concurrent resolution No. 20, favoring the promotion of Colonel James Jackson to the grade

of brigadier general on the retired list, and senate joint resolution No. 4, favoring an increase in the pensions of Indian war veterans.

WHERE NEWTOWN PIPPINS

WERE FIRST ORIGINATED

Newtown, less than a century ago a charming district on Long Island, N. Y., the place where the famous Newtown Pippin originated, is now the Second ward of Queens borough in Greater New York. They are having a dispute over the naming and renaming of their streets. One party insists on sacrificing old names and substituting such misfits as Ajax avenue, Neptune avenue, Venus avenue, and so on, for Horse Brook road, Old Shell road, Feather Bed lane, and the like. Among the historic names that have been sacrificed is Washington street, which was laid out through a field in which Washington encamped in 1776. The native town of Oregon's great Newtown Pippin deserves better handling. This apple, like all great fruits, was a freak or accident.—Exchange.
