TROOPS ORDERED OUT FOR INDIANA STRIKERS

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 2.—Three companies of the Indiana National Guard are under arms and in readiness to proceed to Muncie, Anderson and other places along the line of the Indiana Union Traction company, whose employees are on a strike. The companies at Winchester, Kokomo, Greenfield and Lebanon were ordered by Governor Handy to prepare for action.

MUNCIE, Ind., Jan. 2.—Blasting was resumed here today. Nine were injured in the fight between strikers and explosives in the employ of the traction company. Shots were fired, dynamite and other explosives thrown. Cars started this morning without safety, their chutes carrying fragments to also with fatalities. Later 2000 people gathered and stayed the night. The strike to close people driven from the city at several points.

FOUR HUNDRED STUDENTS AT STATE UNIVERSITY

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene. L.—The following table, taken from the records of the registrar's office, shows that the students of the University of Oregon come from practically every county in the state. There are now in attendance in the departments at Eugene, exclusive of music, 400 students, which is the largest body of students of college rank enrolled in any institution in Oregon. That they are not from the homes of the rich is shown by the fact that nearly 70 per cent of them are either wholly or partially earning their own way. Most of them are registered from the smaller cities of the state that support good high schools. The following counties are represented: Baker, Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Gilliam, Grant, Jackson, Josephine, Klamath, Lane, Linn, Marion, Morrow, Multnomah, Polk, Sherman, Tillamook, Umatilla, Union, Wasco, Washington, Wheeler, Yamhill.
