MONTANA GREATEST OF COPPER CAMPS

Principal Copper-Producing Section of the World—Decrease Shown in Output Over Previous Years, But Still Ahead of Other Places.

Montana's output of blister copper in 1906 amounted to 294,701,252 pounds, a decrease of about 20,000,000 pounds from the production in 1905, but still amply sufficient to keep the state in the first place among the copper producers of this greatest copper-producing country of the world.

World's Greatest Copper Camp.

Nearly the entire production of the state came, as in former years, from the Butte district, in Silver Bow county, which is the greatest copper camp in the world. The mines of the Anaconda, the North Butte, the Butte, the Clark and the East Butte and the Pittsburg and Montana companies contributed considerably to the output, and a few other companies produced a little.

The Year's Developments.

The productive area of the Butte district is remarkably small for so great an output. Most of the ore bodies are large, though they are more tabular than in many camps, and hence are not especially wide.
