A third of the Mankin boys had by this time armed himself with a rifle and came to the rescue of his brothers, and with a well-directed shot eaught Wals-worth in the left eye, the bullet passing around the skull and out near the left A shotgun by this time had been brought into requisition from some quar ter and was used on the elder Wals-worth, disabling his right arm, and also on the son of Walsworth, who had ap-peared in support of his father. The younger Walsworth was shot in the face and hands. A criminal charge will be lodged against Charles Walsworth.
