PORTLAND APPLE MARKET IS IMPROVING STEADILY

Advices from Portland announce that the market for apples, which became de moralized during the holiday senson has been much firmer, higher prices are quoted on some grades than two weeks ago, and there is every reason for the belief that conditions will steadily im-prove as the season advances. Receipts from the country are much lighter than in December, indicating that stocks are largely out of growers' hands, and the available supply in the Front street market is not such as to give dealers

any apprehension.

A feature of the trade, according to as jobber, is that the demand for the beaper sorts of apples, which was strong a few weeks ago, has fallen off materially. At the same time the stocks of inferior fruit have been much re-

At this time of the year it is neces sary for dealers to repack some of the varieties that are offered, for with some that are not first class keepers a few damaged apples are likely to be found in any box. Repacked Baldwins, the box, while Ben Davis, repacked, go at \$1.25, and Jonathans, repacked, at \$1.50 to \$1.65. Spitzenbergs, Newtown Pippins and other late keeping sorts do not require packing at this time. These are held at prices ranging from \$1.35 to

Recent reports from the east show improvement in the apple markets generally. Stocks of low-grade stuff have been largely worked off, and the propeet is for a stendily stiffening market for the better grades from this time on. No large shipments are being made here to eastern markets now, and it is the belief of some dealers that few if any will be made, for it is figured that sent stocks will be none too large for the regular coast consumption.
