WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 11.-The Japanese question seems to be growing bigger and more dangerous every day. It is the prevailing opinion that failure on the part of the United States to negotiate an exclusion treaty with Ja-pan and the failure of congress to leg-islate upon the matter would start more

President Roosevelt has held frequent conferences with the California and other Pacific coast delegations, and it is believed that he will yet arrange a suitable exclusion treaty with Japan. The matter has been left in the president's hands for the present.

CHICAGO, Jan. 11.—In an interview William Jennings Bryan made the de chratien that he is for the exclusion o Orientals or Asiaties. He said it is impossible for them to assimilate with the Caucasians of the United States. He says, however, that the Orientals in the United States must be given protection and that their property rights should be guaranteed. "I will not venture to say by what means those races could be excluded." said Brynn. "But I will say that any means would be justified in the end,"


