A COLORED SHOWMAN WHO LIED WAS LYNCHED

—SELMA, N. C., Jan. 13.—The lynching at Pine Level, Johnston county, of a strange negro at the hands of a negro mob is reported. The negro, purporting to be an advance agent of a "big show," induced the negro residents into attendance of what turned out to be a one-man performance by the negro himself. Their heads covered with boards, the mob entered the negro's boarding house early in the morning and took him forcibly to the woods. His body was found at daylight on the Southern railway tracks.
