MANY PEOPLE HEADED THIS WAY FROM EAST

The somewhat disturbed financial situation in the east and south is causing industrial institutions in the older states to investigate the opportunities for a more advantageous home in the great Pacific Northwest, or at least this would be indicated by the fact that the Portland Commercial club has had more correspondence on this subject within the last 60 days than during the previous 12 months.

The immigration to Oregon and Washington this year ought to be double that of last. In no other two states has every character of crop yielded so enormously and commanded such a high price. People in the older communities are disposed to move, and the Pacific Northwest should get more than its proportion of new citizens, but to accomplish this all the commercial bodies must work in harmony and individuals must participate through private correspondence, which is the strongest influence of all.
