### MANY IDLE CARS ALONG WESTERN RAILROAD LINES

A conservative estimate of the number of idle railroad cars in the Pacific Northwest is said to be 6000 to 7000. These figures include the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Nevada and Arizona. On the O. R. & N. Co.'s lines alone are upward of 2500 idle freight cars. The cause assigned is falling off of merchandise movement, the holding of a portion of the grain crop by interior farmers and millers, and the decrease of the east-bound lumber movement.

A Boston dispatch from the Journal says that according to compilations by the Boston News bureau, there are upward of 119,000 railroad cars idle in the United States. The same bureau's figures on the states of Oregon, Idaho, California, Nevada and Arizona place the number of idle cars in those states at 3582.

There are more idle cars than that in the states of Oregon and California alone. If the Boston bureau's figures are as far under the fact for other sections of the country its estimate for the whole United States is believed to be fully 40 per cent too low.

### PLANNING TO COMPLETELY DRAIN TULE LAKE BED

D. N. Murphy, engineer in charge of the Klappan project, contemplates a trip to Tule Lake to investigate the drainage of the lake. He wants to know what effect dynamite will have and experiments will be made.

The government geologists show a slight rise in the water of the lake since the recent season, which may be due to the strong south wind. The position at the new outlet indicates that in those past times was an opening there between two walls, which supported an arch that formed a natural bridge. These walls gave way, letting the top fall in, thus forming a dam, which has been enlarged through the accumulation of debris. By removing these rocks, the lake can be quickly and easily drained.

### FINE NEW HOME FOR JOSEPHINE COUNTY POOR

The "county house," as it is called, or home for the indigent of Josephine county, near Grants Pass, has been completed, and all indigent of the county have been notified by the county court to take up quarters at the place provided for them.

The county house is located on a hill slope two miles from Grants Pass, the grounds being grown to laurel, oak and other native trees. The building contains 20 rooms, with many modern conveniences, such as bathrooms, wardrobes and other accessories.

The building is electric lighted and steam heated. A portion of it will be used for a county hospital, where the sick and injured will be cared for.

A supervisor has been appointed by the county court and will have entire charge of the farm and home.
