THREATEN TO CUT DOWN ALL PASSENGER RATES

The state of Washington is on the verge of attempting by legislation to reduce railroad passenger rates, that may involve the state of Oregon in a similar contest.

The trouble arises over the refusal of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific to conform to rules of the railroad commission as to mileage, and the commission threatens to demand a general reduction of railway passenger rates to 2 1/2 cents per mile.

In Washington the Great Northern issues a mileage book, the coupons of which indicate miles, while the Northern Pacific companies have put out mileage books in which the values are indicated by cents.

The conductor who takes mileage out of a Great Northern mileage book appropriates the number of miles between two given points, regardless of the reduced fare that may be in effect for any reason between those points.

The Washington railway commission has taken the position that the conductor must not put any more mileage than the amount reported the current fare between the points, even though the rate be less than a cent a mile.

The railroad company has refused to obey the order.

OUTBREAK OF RIOTERS AT LISBON IS QUELED

LISBON, Jan. 29.—An outbreak of rioting on the streets of this city occurred this afternoon, in which about 5000 men and some women were involved.

The disturbance was of short duration, the police having been promptly called.

The crowd made use of revolvers and for a few minutes the firing was heavy, but the crowd finally gave way and dispersed before the show of force.

The official statement published after the rioting says that a number of persons were seriously wounded. The rioting was a new one.
