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ASK DEMOCRATS TO COME HERE

Portland Business Men Seek to Bring Convention to Oregon from Denver—Preparations to Meet Great Inland Empire Excursion Sunday.

PORTLAND, Feb. 3.—Portland business men have determined to make a united and most enthusiastic effort to secure from the Trans-Continental Passenger association a special rate through to Portland and other points in the Pacific northwest for delegates and others who will attend the national Democratic convention to be held in the metropolis of Colorado next July.

This was the topic of a meeting held at the parlors of the Portland Commercial club Friday night, and letters were forwarded Saturday to the meeting of the passenger agents now in session at Coronado Beach, Cal. 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HARRY EDMUNDS HOTEL ON EAST SIDE OPENED

The grand opening of the Hotel Heyser, of which Harry Edmunds, formerly of Medford, is manager, in the Proudfoot building, at the east end of the Burnside bridge, at Portland, took place Saturday evening, February 1. An orchestra furnished music from 8 to 12 o'clock and a table d'hote dinner was served from 5 to 8:30.

The hotel has been elegantly furnished and is one of the handsomest in the city. There are 80 rooms in the building, 33 of which are furnished with separate baths. The grill is roomy and appropriately decorated and has a tile floor. The building is four stories high and a roof garden, which will be the only one in the city, will be installed next summer.

All the floors in the building are cement. The building itself is fireproof, being of reinforced concrete. The hotel will be a family hotel.
