SINGLE TAX AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION WANTED

SALEM, Or., Feb. 3.—E. S. J. McAllister and Secretary H. W. Stone of the Y. M. C. A. of Portland have filed a petition with the secretary of state to initiate an amendment to section 1 of article 9 of the state constitution providing for a system of single taxation. Originally the petitions contained over 12,000 signatures, but many of them were found defective and were thrown out and the number of signatures now totals 11,612.
