NO TARIFF REVISION AT PRESENT SESSION

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—The present congress will not appoint a tariff commission. Revision of the tariff will be undertaken next winter, in the short term. These announcements, in substance, were made by Chairman Payne of the house committee on ways and means, in the presence and with the tacit approval of Speaker Cannon, the occasion being a call upon those leaders by a tariff revision delegation from various parts of the country, comprising representatives of many of the biggest manufacturing and industrial concerns in the United States, and headed by James W. Van Cleave of St. Louis, president of the National Association of Manufacturers; ex-Governor N. J. Buehler of New Hampshire, and H. E. Miles of Racine, Wis., chairman of the tariff committee of the National Association of Manufacturers.

BIG POWER PLANT TO BE BUILT AT PRINEVILLE

PRINEVILLE, Or., Feb. 6.—H. V. H. V. Gates of Hillsboro, president of the Prineville Light & Power company and several other lighting plants throughout the state, has given out that construction of an immense power plant at Lava Falls, on the Deschutes, six miles south of Bend, will begin in the early spring. The plant is to be completed within a year. It is to cost \$150,000 and will serve the towns of

Bend, Laidlaw, Redmond and Prineville with a 24-hour current for lighting and other purposes. The company expects to secure 2000-horsepower at Lava Falls.

Negotiations between Mr. Gates and F. S. Stanley of the Deschutes Irriga-

tion & Power company, which has filed on the water right there, are now under way. The company has agreed to transfer to Mr. Gates all the water necessary for the project, reserving an amount necessary for the reclamation of its segregation.
