OTAHEITE ORANGE.

A Dwarf, Free Flowering and Fruiting Tree Easily Grown.

It is strange that the orange tree is so little grown by amateurs, not, of course, for the value of the fruit, but because it is so easily grown and so ornamental, either in flower or fruit.

More lumber was cut in the United States last year than in any other year in its history.

A glance at the kinds of lumber produced shows very clearly the passing of white pine and oak, one the greatest soft wood and the other the greatest hard wood which the forest has ever grown.

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A comparison of the lumber-producing states shows that since 1899 there have been many changes in their relative rank.

The Otaheite orange shown in our illustration is, as will be noted, a dwarf, free flowering and fruiting variety that may be grown just as easily as the common orange, says a gardenling.

Orange trees are apt to be attacked by scale, a troublesome insect pest that clings closely to the leaves or stems and they can only be kept in check by frequent spraying of the leaves.

The highest priced native woods are walnut, hickory, and ash, and the cheapest are larch and white fir.

Figure upon the lumber cut of the United States in 1907 are contained in Circular 122 of the Forest Service, which can be had upon application to the Forester, United States Department of Agriculture, Washington.

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BIGGEST CUT OF LUMBER

Enormous Amount of Timber Turned Out Last Year—Thirty-seven Billion Feet Cut, Valued at Six Hundred Million Dollars.

More lumber was cut in the United States last year than in any other year in its history. The enormous amount of 37,590,730,000 feet was produced and the mill value of this was \$621,151,388.
