DR. STRANGE PASSES AWAY AT HOME IN ROSEBURG

Dr. J. W. Strange, one of the best-known settlers of Douglas county, died at an early hour Sunday at Roseburg, of dropsy, aged 55 years. Dr. Strange was born in Blount county, Tennessee, November 21, 1852, and came to Oregon in the spring of 1871, settling at Wilbur, Douglas county. He was married on January 21, 1879, to Miss Frances Cox. In the '80s he was reading clerk of the house of representatives and chief clerk of the senate. He was also school superintendent of Douglas county during the years 1881 and 1882, being editor of the Plaindealer of this city while holding the office of school superintendent. He removed from here to Eastern Oregon and for a time was editor of the Pendleton Tribune, from which place he went to Coos county, remaining there until 1904, when he returned to Roseburg and entered into the practice of his profession, dentistry. He was also editor and owner of the Spokesman, published in this city, Spokesman, published in Roseburg, which work he continued until two months ago, when ill health forced him to rest. He was one of the builders and a member of the Presbyterian church and a member of the I. O. O. F., A. O. U. W. and W. O. W. lodges of Roseburg. Besides his wife and son he leaves several brothers and sisters. His nephew was one of the founders of the Medford Tribune.

TO FORCE SALE OF WAGON ROAD GRANTS

Through a suit in equity filed by 91 plaintiffs in the United States circuit court at attempt is being made to force the Southern Oregon company and the Coos Bay Wagon Road company to sell 12,000 acres of land in the Coos Bay wagon road grant for \$2.50 per acre. The suit makes Attorney General Bonaparte and the United States defendants and is based upon a resolution introduced in the senate recently by Senator Tillman seeking to force the holding companies to abandon their claims on the property or to fulfil the terms of the Government grants by selling the land at the stipulated price of \$2.50 per acre. In addition to the many plaintiffs named in the suit, all of whom claim to be residents of the United States, the document filed contains many John Doss and Richard Rook. The various people who filed on the lands did so recently at Empire City. John R. Herzon and others against the Southern Oregon company is the title of the suit. The papers filed in the case contain over 100 pages of typewritten matter.
