AMUSEMENTS

"Old Arkansas" is a well-told story—a real play with a real plot, and is portrayed by a company of the very best people in the theatrical profession. A grand old special scenery and many new and novel effects and mechanical devices all combine in making this the dramatic and comedy event of the season. The state of Arkansas has always been a fertile field for the novelist and for romance, but it has remained for Fred Raymond to transport its scenes into the dramatic field, taking as his central theme a former train robbery which occurred there some years back; he has woven a melodramatic comedy about it, which has already proven its worth by seven years of successful existence. Mr. Raymond claims that his play is founded on fact. Whether fact or fiction, it is really interesting story of life, of love, of mystery, of intrigue and adventure among the old class of moonshine mountaineers that inhabit those hills, dealing with their lives, their habits, their customs, their social characteristics and peculiarities. The scenery was painted from actual photographs of the various localities pictured and every character is true to life. Dramatic in all of its scenes and melodramatic in many, it never transcends the bounds of probability and no one need stretch the imagination to be convinced of its reality. So true to nature is it in every scene that it seems to be a bit of life actually transcribed from its original setting to the stage.

FIVE BIG CONCERNS OWN MOST OF HARNEY COUNTY

Harney county is the only county in the state in which five concerns own practically one half the assessed valuation. The assessment of this county for 1907 totals \$2,592,595 and five corporations aggregate \$1,169,674 of that amount, as follows: Pacific Livestock Co., \$355,950; H. L. Corbett, \$375,010; Oliver Alsbach (The Road Co.), \$39,530; William Wauley Co., \$99,850; Jennie Deane estate, \$41,134. And these five can be now reckoned as really only four, because the H. L. Corbett interests and the Wauley company interests have been consolidated. This county is assessed on the basis of one-third cash valuation, but the large holdings of the Willamette Valley & Cascade Mountain Wagon Road company and others are listed at an average of about \$2 an acre, while the cheapest strip now on the market is \$8.25 an acre, and school scrip is \$8.75, so the assessment is not even one-third. Hereafter the property will be listed at full cash value and there is also a general demand that the land of the non-resident speculative shall be assessed at the same rate as the land of the resident homesteader, which is of the same character.

NUDE PICTURES SHOCK GRANTS PASS COUNCIL

GRANTS PASS, Or., Feb. 14.—A complaint that may bring serious trouble for the officers and members of the Grants Pass Firemen's association is made by the property committee of the city council to the effect that the firemen have gone to an extreme in decorating the rooms of the firemen's meeting rooms with nude pictures and paintings. The councilmen state that the city property has been desecrated and a "cheating out" of the firemen's meeting room is advised.
