REFUSES APPLICATION TO STOP STUB TRAIN

The Oregon railway commission has refused an application of the Southern Pacific company for canceling of an order recently issued by the commission requiring a stub train to be run from Roseburg on days when the overland train is behind time. It is shown that the stub train is no longer necessary, as the regular train now starts from Roseburg and is always on time. The commission held that as the order had frequently been violated by the company it should remain tentatively in effect.

PRODUCTION OF COAL SHOWS AN INCREASE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—A production of between 450,000,000 and 460,000,000 short tons of coal in the United States in 1907 is indicated by the returns received thus far by the United States geological survey, or an increase of about 10 per cent over the record breaking output of 1906.
The production of Pacific anthracite increased 20 per cent to about \$5,840,000, the panic having no effect. The production of bituminous coal increased 7 to 10 per cent. In the eastern states the panic caused such a decrease in production as to wipe out the increase of the first nine months. The total output was about 375,000,000 tons of bituminous.
