

# BUT THREE DAYS MORE TO WIN THE PRIZES

You have seen any number of your friends and have secured thousands of votes from them, and they give you these votes and subscriptions under the impression that you were going to win one of the prizes—at least you were going to do your best to win—and it would not be giving your friends a fair race were you to stop working now when the race is so nearly over.

### The Prize-Winners

Will be made up of those ladies who work right up to the last moment of the contest, who turn in subscriptions and votes until the ballot box is closed for the last time and is ready to be

delivered into the hands of the judges. And if you have any idea of winning one of those prizes you had better not give up the fight until the very last moment.

All that is required to win prizes in a contest of this sort is the ability and aggressiveness to stick to it until the last dog is hung.

### Notice to Candidates.

The last official standings of the candidates to appear in the paper will be in the issue of Thursday evening, and from that time until the close of the contest the standings of the contestants will be the same in the issues of Friday and Saturday. There will be votes counted after Wednesday evening until the close of the contest, when the judges to be selected this week will make the final count.

On Wednesday night the ballot box will be opened for the last time and when locked again the keys will be turned over to one of the judges, who will keep it in his possession until the box is opened for the last count. Pay particular attention to this and do not forget that the position you will hold in the paper on Thursday evening will be the same you will have in the papers of Friday and Saturday.

### Excitement Grows

As the contest nears the close, and it promises to be intense during the closing hours. Every one in the city can feel the excitement of the contest on the Medford Tribune and they are all trying to pick the winner of the beautiful Reo Automobile.

But as a rule they have a hard time in trying to select the lady who will eventually carry home the car. All the contestants are working tooth and nail and are doing all in their power to secure sufficient votes to land them in the final roll of honor.

### Assistance Is Forthcoming.

All votes that have already been issued must be in the ballot box by 10 o'clock Saturday night; although if a contestant is in the office with her subscriptions before 10 o'clock and she cannot be waited upon at that time, she will be allowed votes on her subscriptions, these votes to be cast as soon as issued; for instance, if a contestant is in the office turning in subscriptions and receiving votes, although she is

Subscriptions may be paid in to the Tribune office until 8 o'clock Saturday night.
