OWNED TIMBER LAND IN MANY COUNTIES

OREGON CITY, Or., Feb. 25.—The will of the late George Baldwin, who died at his home in Appleton, Wis., December 7, 1907, was filed for probate here. Appleton died possessed of a large amount of timber and steel large amount of timber lands in Clarkamas, Benton, Clatsop, Crook, Douglas, Coos, Jackson, Lane, Linn, Marion, Polk, Tillamook and Washington counties, and while the value of his property in Oregon is not stated in the papers filed in the county clerk's office, a bond of \$40,000 was required from W. L. Brewster, the administrator. Baldwin was 78 years of age and left a wife and two sons. His widow received by his will securities worth \$100,000 besides Appleton city property.

INCORPORATE OIL COMPANY TO BORE AT KLAMATH

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Feb. 25.—The incorporators of the Klamath Oil company at a meeting in this city have elected the following officers: G. Heitler, president; J. E. Hall, vice-president and general manager; Pierce Evans, secretary; G. W. White of the First National bank, treasurer. The basis of the company were \$100,000 and \$200,000 worth of stock was subscribed immediately. The company has leases on several thousand acres of land, besides one of about 1500 acres in the upper end of the valley, near Bonanza. It also has a lease, with a privilege to buy, on the Horton ranch of 3000 acres. It is stated there is a spring on the company's land from which oil is now being produced. NEW YORK TUNNEL AND SUBWAY SYSTEM TO HOBOKEN OPENS

President Roosevelt Touches the Button Which Starts Official Train Through Tubes Under River to Metropolitan—Excursion Held at Hoboken.

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—The tunnel and subway system connecting Hoboken with New York by tubes under the Hudson river was formally opened when President Roosevelt pressed the button in Washington today, thus starting an official train from New York to Hoboken. Excursions were held in Hoboken.

REPUBLICAN PARTY ARRAIGNED FOR SINS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—A general arraignment of the republican party was made in the house today by Garrett of Tennessee, who charged that during its entire career the republican party had "just three fundamental arguments," two based on the civil war and its outcome, and that "for two decades the bloody shirt was the party banner, and behind its crimson flowing folds they marched to victory after victory," and, third, that republican success means prosperity and democratic does not, and that this had become the party hymn. Not for 20 years, he charged, had the republican party as such faced an issue squarely, "out in the open sunlight of judgment and reason."

MORE MEN DISCHARGED BY IARRIMAN'S ORDERS

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Feb. 25.—Two hundred men in the motive department of the Southern Pacific shops here were laid off today in line with the general Harriman policy of retrenchment on the western roads, on account of slack business. Married men are given the preference. It is announced that the men will probably be re-employed before summer, when heavy freight business again sets in.

WEDDING CELEBRATED BY KNIVES

CHICAGO, Feb. 25.—Four men were stabbed, probably fatally, and 15 others, including a policeman, severely cut and several others slightly injured in a riot between two factions of Polish celebrators today. The fight marked the end of festivities in the saloon of Joseph Kuta, 73 Front street. The rioters were guests at the wedding of Leo Chusick and Mary Wadaya. The conflict had its origin in an old controversy between the two factions, and a free-for-all fight followed, in which beer bottles, chairs and tables were used. Joseph Wadaya, a brother of the bride, was frightfully cut, his ears and lips being slashed off. Policeman John McDonough, detailed to the hall, had his hands cut and his uniform slashed to pieces. The riot call brought a squad of police, who, after a fight, succeeded in arresting 20 rioters. The bride and groom were arrested, but released. Webb Sculling Champion.
