COMMISSION TO MARK OLD OREGON TRAIL

Should the Humphrey bill, providing for the marking of the Oregon trail, become a law, Ezra Mosher, the pioneer of Puyallup, George H. Himes, one of Portland's earliest settlers, and Clarence B. Bagley of Seattle probably will be the commission to undertake the direction of the work. This recommendation, adopted at a meeting last night of historians, college professors and distinguished pioneers of the northwest, will be transmitted to President Roosevelt.

HOLIDAY FRIENDS DON'T LIKE LEAF YEAR

Washington's birthday, Memorial day and the Fourth of July in 1908 all fall on Saturday. This gives the public three double holidays.

Ordinarily these three do not fall on the same day, but by the intervention of the 29th of February this year Washington's birthday comes just 14 weeks earlier than Memorial day, which regularly comes five weeks before the Fourth of July.

The advantage of having a holiday adjacent a Sunday for people who desire the opportunity to make trips out of town is very great.

In creating the last holiday, Labor day, advantage of this principle was taken in the selection of a first Monday instead of a numbered day of the month.

In 1909 Washington's birthday falls on Monday, the 30th of May, and the Fourth of July on Sunday, which will mean a Monday observance, so that for two years in successive double holidays are assured. In the latter year Christmas will also fall on Saturday, thereby affording the most complete trial of the double holidays possible in the calendar.
