

BOURNE HAS NO SENATORIAL CHOICE

Senator States That He Will Not Instrumental in Bringing Out U'Ren—Will Take No Hand in Primary Fight, but Will Assist Statement No. 1.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Senator Bourne when asked if Mr. U'Ren is his candidate to succeed Senator Fulton, replied: "I haven't been instrumental either directly or indirectly in bringing out and candidate for the senate. Honorable W. S. U'Ren has a perfect right, as has any United States senator, or any other officer under the Oregon primary law, if he so desires. I have the highest personal regard for Mr. U'Ren. I believe that he has done more for our state than any other 20 men in it to elevate the political and legislative tone of Oregon. I believe that he would make an efficient, able senator. Senator Fulton, my colleague here, has been a hard-working, able, efficient and influential public servant. Our relations have always been pleasant, although we sometimes disagree on public questions. Honorable H. M. Calkins is a candidate for the senate. He was one of my competitors for the primary nomination when I was nominated and very nearly defeated me for nomination. In fact, for several days it was assumed that he had been the successful candidate. He gave me very loyal and able support after I received the nomination. "The position I am now in is an embarrassing and delicate one. In my opinion it is my duty to take no hand in the primary nominations for United States senator, but it is my duty both in the primary and general election to do all in my power for the recognition and perpetuation of the primary law, including Statement No. 1. I deem the principle involved as being of greater importance than any individual's success, and I reiterate my advice to my friends and constituents in Oregon that in their own interest, in the interest of cleaner politics, in the interest of true republicanism and in the interest of completely enfranchised and ideal American citizenship, they vote for Statement No. 1 nominees only for the legislature in the republican primaries in April, see that they vote for Statement No. 1 legislative nominees in the June election and that they vote for their party nominee for United States senator. In Oregon the key to continued triumph for republican party principles, in the rule of the sovereign people, as exemplified in Lincoln and Roosevelt, is the perpetuation of the true primary election law and Statement No. 1."

RESOLUTION.

Be It Resolved, by the City Council of the City of Medford, Oregon, the Mayor approving, That the following proposed amendment to the City Charter of the City of Medford be submitted to the legal voters of said city for their approval or rejection at a special election to be held in said city on the 17th day of March, 1908:

Proposed Amendment To Section 72 of the City Charter of the City of Medford. The people of the City of Medford do ordain as follows:

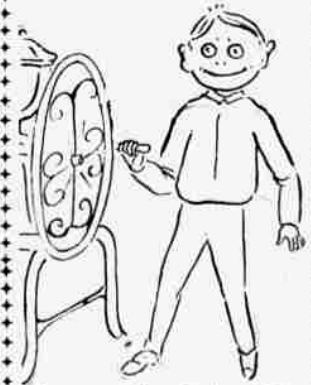
That section 72 of an act of the legislature of the State of Oregon, entitled "An act to repeal an act entitled 'An act to incorporate the Town of Medford, in Jackson County, Oregon, and limiting its powers and defining the duties of its officers,' and to repeal an act entitled 'An act to incorporate the Town of Medford, in Jackson County, Oregon,' approved February 24, 1885," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 21, 1889, and all amendments thereof, and to incorporate the City of Medford, in Jackson County, Oregon, and to define its powers and duties," approved February 6, 1901, and to incorporate the City of Medford, in Jackson County, Oregon, define its powers and duties, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 7, 1905, as amended by the act amendatory thereof filed in the office of the secretary of state February 13, 1905, and as further amended by the vote of the people of Medford on the 4th day of June, 1907, be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto the following: "Subdivision C. In addition to the foregoing warrants and bonds, as authorized in the two preceding subdivisions of this section, the said council is further authorized to borrow money on the faith of the city, and for that purpose to issue warrants and bonds for the sole purpose of further improving the water distributing system of said city, provided that the mains installed in improving said system shall all be of cast iron of approved design and manufacture; but in the event that said council shall elect to install a system of cast iron mains as above mentioned, and shall issue warrants and bonds as provided in this subdivision for such purpose, the total amount of warrants and bonds so issued shall at no time exceed the sum of \$25,000 in addition to the warrants and bonds in the two preceding subdivisions authorized, and in the event that such warrants and bonds shall be issued, such issue shall be in all respects subject to the provisions and restrictions of subdivision B of this section, except as to the maximum amount of such issue. Following is the form in which the above amendment will appear upon the ballots:

NINE-HOUR DAY IN SIGHT FOR DISPATCHERS

Nine hours a day for train dispatchers, signal tower men and telegraph operators, 16 hours a day for locomotive engineers, firemen, brakemen, conductors, yardmen and switchmen. This is the new scale of hours the Southern Pacific are busily arranging to put into effect on and after March 4. They are to do this in order to comply with a law passed by the last congress which becomes operative on March 4 and which is entrusted to the interstate commerce commission for enforcement. On the Pacific coast, Southern Pacific and Santa Fe employ to the number of 8000 will be favorably affected by the change in hours. On the Harriman roads alone in the west 12,000 will have their working hours reduced. The change will be made with practically no friction, because the volume of business is unusually light at present, owing to the effects of the recent money stringency.
