islature of the State of Oregon, entitled "An act to repeal an act entitled "An act to repeal an act entitled "An act to incorporate the Town of Medford, in Jackson County, Oregon, and limiting its powers and defining the duties of its officers," and to repeal an act enits officers, and to report the Town of Medford, in Jackson County, Oregon,' approved February 24, 1885," filed in the office of the secretary of state Pebruary 21, 1889, and all amend ments thereof, and to incorporate the City of Medford, in Jackson County, Oregon, and to define its powers and duties, approved February 6, 1901, and to incorporate the City of Medford, in Jackson County, Oregon, define its powers and duties, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith, filed in the office of the secretary of state February 7, 1905, as amended by the act amendatory thereof filed in the office of the secretary of state Febru-ary 13, 1965, and as further amended by the vote of the people of Medford on the 4th day of June, 1967, be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto the following: "Subdivision C. In addition to the

foregoing warrants and bonds, as au-thorized in the two preceding subdivisions of this section, the said council is further authorized to berrow money on the faith of the city, and for that purpose to issue warrant and bonds for the sale purpose of further improving the water distributing system of said city, provided that the mains installed in improving said system shall all be of east from of approved design and manufacture; but in the event that said conneil shall elect to install a system of east iron mains as above mentioned, and shall issue warrants and bonds as provided in this subdivision for such ourpose, the total amount of warrants and bonds so issued shall at no time ex-ceed the sum of \$25,000 invaddition to the warrants and bonds in the two pre-ceding subdivisions authorized, and in the event that such warrants and bonds all respects subject to the provisions and restrictions of subdivision B of this section, except as to the maximum


