OREGON MAY SUPPLY POTATOES TO WARSHIPS

PORTLAND, March 4.—There is a possibility that the government order for 21 cars of potatoes for the battleship fleet will be filled in Oregon. The bids were opened at San Francisco and the lowest bid was \$1.05. The potatoes are to be delivered at San Diego and the specifications call for a quality that can only be secured at Watsonville or in Oregon. Neither this order nor the larger order that will later be placed for delivery at San Francisco are likely to have effect on the market, owing to the large available supply of potatoes on the coast.

The onion market was quiet. Some growers sold in a small way at \$2.50, and buyers were willing to pay this price, but would go no higher. A direct shipment of 800 sacks of Japanese onions reached San Francisco Monday and 300 sacks are due in Portland this week on the Oriental liner.

ENJOINS SHERIFF FROM SELLING GRANT LANDS

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., March 4.—Judge Henry L. Benson of the circuit court has issued an injunction to prevent the sheriff of Klamath county from selling the lands of the Oregon & California Land company for delinquent taxes. This order is in accordance with the complaint filed last week by the company's attorneys, protesting against the 1906 valuation on the large holdings of this company. Thousands of acres in the northern part of Klamath county, practically worthless, according to the complaint, were valued at \$3 and \$5 per acre in 1906, while the 1907 valuation was 75 cents per acre. Lands for sale on account of delinquent taxes were offered Saturday, but the judge's order excluded these lands, pending further court proceedings.

HARRIMAN RAILROADS TO ANSWER TO REBATING

SAN FRANCISCO, March 4.—Raymond Benjamin, assistant attorney-general of the state, has returned from Los Angeles, where he had been investigating the alleged rebating practices of the Santa Fe and Salt Lake railroads. He brought with him a long report prepared during the fortnight he spent in the Southern city examining the books of the Santa Fe and Clark roads. Today he submitted the report to Attorney General Webb.
On Thursday the railroad commission will begin its investigation of the rebating methods of the Southern Pacific company, and it may be found that from the data obtained by Benjamin in Los Angeles it will be possible to proceed with the investigation of the other roads also.
Benjamin refused to discuss his work in the south. "Tomorrow I shall make my report to General Webb," said he, "and if anything is to be given out it will come from him."

FULTON TO FIGHT FOR RAILROAD RATE BILL

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Senator Fulton declared today he would get a report on his rate law amendment bill. He proposes not to "lay down," but is prepared to fight for his measure.
It is learned that some members of the interstate commerce commission are displeased that Chairman Knapp committed them against the Fulton bill. Considerable feeling may develop in the commission over the aspect the case has assumed.

BLUE MOUNTAIN RESERVE SOON OPEN TO SETTLEMENT

WASHINGTON, March 4.—The 131,643 acres of land limited from the Blue mountain forest reserve by the proclamation of January 8, will become subject to settlement June 1, and entry and filing July 1. Forty per cent of this land is embraced in pending filings of applications.

Snow Off Trolley Line.

PRAGUE, Or., March 4.—A force of 20 men and half a dozen teams was set to work on the Eugene-Springfield trolley line Monday and the road will soon be completed. The work was stopped last fall when the financial stringency came on, and nothing had been done on the line since. A larger force will be put on as soon as the weather settles, and it is expected the electric cars will be running into Springfield by the middle of the summer. Work on the bridge across the Willamette at Springfield will begin as soon as the water becomes low enough to enable the contractors to lay the concrete piers.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—The senate public lands committee has reported favorably Senator Heyburn's bill providing for a survey of the Idaho public lands regardless of settlement, amending it to include Oregon in the provisions. Under the existing law, surveys are only made on the application of settlers and settlement is often retarded through disregard of their requests.

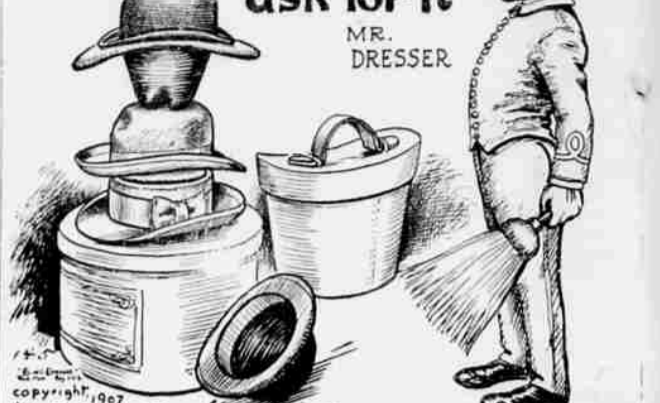
