U'REN WILLING TO QUIT IF CAKE WILL DO SO, TOO
W. S. U'Ren, who last week announced his candidacy for the republican nomination of United States senator, is willing to get out of the race, providing H. M. Cake, also a candidate for senator, will do the same. Mr. U'Ren's sole object is the elevation of Statement No. 1, and he is willing to sacrifice his own political ambition, at ways providing that Mr. Cake will do likewise.
Mr. U'Ren's proposition to Mr. Cake is simply that they both withdraw and allow the Statement No. 1 republicans to center their strength on some man who will be satisfactory to all factions. He mentions Judge McBride, Ben Selling, T. B. Wilcox and T. H. Bingham, but they are only instances, as Mr. U'Ren cares not for men, but for measures. Mr. Cake replies:
"The open letter of Mr. U'Ren comes as a surprise. I would say in reply that more than a month ago I announced my candidacy for the nomination for the United States senatorship after due deliberation upon and careful consideration of the responsibilities involved in my candidacy, and must now most respectfully decline Mr. U'Ren's proposals."
FINNS REMOVE ROOSEVELT'S PICTURE FROM THE WALL
ASTORIA, Or., March 5.—The Suomi Temperance society of this city, an organization composed entirely of Finnish members, went on record by a majority vote at its meeting on last Friday evening as being opposed to the government, and even went so far as to order President Roosevelt's picture removed from the walls of the hall, where it had hung for a long time.
This action, it is said, is not sanctioned by the leading members of the society, but was the work of the radical element. It appears that at a social held on Sunday, February 25, the announcement was made that anyone who desired to join the society within a stated period could do so without the payment of the usual initiation fee. As a result, 55 people joined at the meeting on Friday evening, and 45 of them were radical socialists. The claim is made that it was these 45 new members who passed the motion directing the insult to the president.
OREGON DELEGATION FAILS TO SELECT NEW ATTORNEY
WASHINGTON, March 5.—Efforts of the Oregon delegation to hold a meeting to take up the district attorneyship question were not successful. It was first proposed to hold a meeting at 4 o'clock, but it was impracticable for the house members to attend at that hour. It was then proposed that the meeting be held last night, but prior engagements prevented Senator Bourne from agreeing to this arrangement, so that the matter goes over until today, when another effort will be made to get together.
When the delegation does get together it will endeavor to pick a man for district attorney from the first congressional district because the second district already has a majority of the large federal offices. If the first district does not offer a man with suitable requirements and willing to serve, then candidates from the second district will be considered. No member of the delegation admits any preferences and the delegation is to use every endeavor to pick a man who is competent and acceptable, regardless of his past political affiliation. He must be a good republican, however.
PORTLAND LEADS SOUND IN WHEAT SHIPMENTS
Close to 300,000 more bushels of wheat were shipped from Portland in February than from the entire Puget Sound district, according to figures which have been compiled by the Merchants' exchange. Including the coastwise traffic, Portland set off 2,412,720 bushels as against 2,145,512 bushels, dispatched from Seattle, Tacoma, Everett and the other ports of Western Washington. Portland sent 122,830 bushels to California and Puget Sound 89,350 bushels.

HAWLEY TALKS FOR FULTON'S RESOLUTION
WASHINGTON, March 5.—Representative Hawley had a conference with the subcommittee having in charge Senator Fulton's resolution authorizing the attorney-general to institute suit against the Oregon & California Railroad company. He found the subcommittee favorable to the resolution, and it is expected it will be favorably reported to the house without having hearings.
The attorney-general has written a letter to Chairman Mondell explaining the necessity for the passage of the resolution, and it is believed his letter, combined with Representative Hawley's argument last week, will be sufficient on which to base a favorable report. The resolution will probably go to the house in the near future, and no material objection to its final passage is anticipated.
