ASHLAND ELKS PLAN TO BUILD NEW TEMPLE

The purchase of a site was consummated some days before and at a meeting Saturday night Ashland Lodge, No. 844, B. P. O. E., voted to undertake at the earliest possible date the construction of a fine new temple thereon, says the Valley Record.

The site purchased is on the north side of South Main street, near Second, 74x121, being that portion of the Lindsay Applegate farm upon which that old pioneer's dwelling stood. The dwelling is still upon the rear of the lot, but was not included in the purchase and will be removed to another lot.

The Elks never do anything by halves and the building will be equipped with all modern improvements and conveniences and according to the preliminary plans will undoubtedly be about the most commodious as well as the most complete business block in Ashland to date.

C. H. Burgraff, the well-known public building architect, was here Saturday with preliminary plans along the lines of a similar structure being built at Albany. He will be here next Saturday with more complete drawings. The Elks hope to be at work upon the building within a few weeks.

KLAMATH CLAMORING FOR SOIL SURVEY

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., March 13.—Klamath county has made request through Senator Fulton and Congressman Hawley, as well as various organizations in Klamath Falls, that a soil survey be made of the lands coming under the Klamath project by the government.

A letter has been received from Milton Whitney, chief of the bureau of soil survey at Washington, stating that the request would have due consideration, although no time could be set as to the commencement of the survey on account of the vast number of requests already on file and the appropriation that has been made for such work. The matter will not be dropped, but will continue to be urged, and much hope is expressed over the promise that has been given.

The finders of the pocket are rather reticent about the matter and will give nothing for publication. The pocket is supposed to be larger than the one which they uncovered about two years ago. That one was estimated at several thousand dollars.—Gold Hill News.
