ASHLAND ELKS PLAN

TO BUILD NEW TEMPLE

The purchase of a site was consum muted some days before and at a meeting Saturday night Ashland Lodge, No 544, B. P. O. E., voted to undertake at the entitiest possible date the construc-tion of a fine new temple thereon, says the Valley Record. The appointment of a committee to finance and build the structure was authorized. Financing of the project, it is said, is assured and is only a matter of detail.

The site purebased is on the north oud, 74x121, being that portion of the Lindsay Applegate farm upon which that old pioneer's dwelling atood. The dwelling is still upon the rear of the lot, but was not included in the par-chase and will be removed to another lot. The price of the lot was about \$1750. While the pans of the new temple have not been agreed upon in detall, it is proposed to build a threetire lot, 74x121 feet, the first floor to the lat, 74x121 feet, the tirst from to be utilized for mercantile purposes, the second floor to have a row of office thous across the front with the remain-der devoted to social and reading rooms. etc., for the lodge members, while the third floor is to be given over to the
