CHAINS IN AUTO MOBILE CAUSE OF DISEASE

CHICAGO, March 12.—Chains on automobiles which were last night accused of spreading consumption. The charge was made at a meeting of the city council judiciary committee and an ordinance forbidding their use was discussed. Dr. J. L. Pennington, who appeared before the committee, said: "You pass a law forbidding a man to spit on the sidewalk to curb consumption and then you let him put a chain on his automobile wheel to stir up the dust and germs on the street. As a health measure an anti-chain ordinance should be passed."

Members of the committee and Secretary Sidney S. Gorham of the Chicago Automobile club will take an automobile trip to test the allegation that chains on tires are a menace to the public health.

FULTON AND BOURNE ACCEPT AMENDMENT

WASHINGTON, March 13.—Senators Fulton and Bourne have accepted the amendment adopted by the senate to day to the Frye resolution concerning water shipments for Panama canal construction, believing it will adequately protect shipments from Pacific coast ports. The amendment is as follows: "This resolution shall not apply to any port of the United States between which and the Isthmus of Panama there is no vessel owned by the United States or by the Panama railroad or a vessel of the United States plying between such ports and the Isthmus of Panama."

KANSAS POPULISTS IN FAVOR OF TOM WATSON

TOPEKA, Kan., March 13.—Few delegates were present this morning when State Chairman George W. Hanover, of Clay Center, called the populist state convention to order. The purpose of the convention is to elect delegates and alternates to the St. Louis national convention April 2. The naming of state officers and candidates for congress are also to be arranged for. The resolutions favored a full state and congressional ticket, also an endorsement of Thomas Watson. Colonel Felter in his address spoke bitterly of William J. Bryan, and said he would vote for a republican before he would vote for the Nebraskan.

ADMITS SIGNING CHECKS USED IN LAND FRAUDS

LOS ANGELES, March 13.—Dr. Duval M. Goodwin, on cross-examination before Commissioner Van Dyke today in the Oregon land fraud cases, stated he had signed only a few checks while acting as president of the Pacific Furniture & Lumber company. Bundle after bundle of checks were then produced and shown Dr. Goodwin and he acknowledged they bore his signature. The government, in its seizure of the company's records, obtained possession of nearly 1000 of such checks.

CITY OF MEDFORD

Fifty-five trees of Yellow Newtown Pippins produced \$45,000 boxes of fruit, which, in spite of the financial panic in London, panned out \$1714.50 net. These trees grew on less than one acre. The three-acre orchard from which this fruit was taken, has produced an average amount of \$500 net per year for the last eight years. One hundred and fifty new Yellow Newtown Pippin trees produced in 1907 \$1125 L. A. B. Medford. These trees grew on three acres. From eight acres near Ashland 6000 boxes of Newtown Pippin apples were marketed in 1907, netting \$2000 an acre, v. o. b. orchard. For the past seven years this orchard has netted \$791 per acre average. 28-seven acres of Bartlett pears near Medford in 1907 grossed \$2200 per acre. A young Bartlett pear orchard of 20 acres of 8-year-old trees netted \$1018 per acre.

"Twenty Winter Nellis pear trees netted \$6000. These figures show the wonderful profit made in 1907 from apple and pear orchards about Medford—a profit exceeding \$1000 per acre in many cases.

"Although the records for 1908 do not show such wonderful returns, the figures are, nevertheless, exceedingly large. Three-fourths of an acre of Spitznberg produced 587 boxes in 1906, which brought \$1174. Four acres of Spitznberg brought \$2113.10.
