COURT IS CONFIRMED AS DISTRICT ATTORNEY

WASHINGTON, March 19.—The senate, without a dissenting voice, confirmed the nomination of John McCourt for Pendleton as district attorney for Oregon, thus terminating one of the longest and most bitter patronage fights in the history of Oregon. Mr. McCourt's commission will be made out immediately and will probably be forwarded by mail tomorrow. Upon its receipt he will take the oath of office and, upon telegraphing the attorney general that he has done so, will be directed by wire to take full charge of the district attorney's office. W. C. Bristol's recess appointment expires automatically upon the confirmation and qualification of his successor. He is now serving under a recess appointment, given him just one year ago. That appointment would have held him in office until the close of the present session had not Mr. McCourt been confirmed. Mr. McCourt will be expected to take up Mr. Bristol's work just where Mr. Bristol leaves off, including the land fraud cases and matters now before the grand jury. There is no intention of retaining Mr. Bristol, even temporarily, to continue these matters. It is understood that Mr. McCourt will not announce the name of the man he desires permanently appointed assistant district attorney for several weeks.

BOURKE COCKRAN DROPPED FROM TAMMANY BY MURPHY

NEW YORK, March 19.—Charles P. Murphy, leader of Tammany Hall, was quoted in a published statement as saying that the reason why Representative W. Bourke Cockran had been dropped from important chairmanships in the Tammany organization was that Mr. Cockran was not a democrat. Mr. Cockran was quick to retort: "It is beyond my intellect. It is well known that I have written all the definitions of democracy accepted and approved by Mr. Murphy during the last four years. Which of them does he now repudiate and on what ground? Surely he cannot wish us to infer that he is incapable, as his critics assert, of understanding the significance of expressions which he applauded publicly. It is all very amusing and amazing."

SOUTHERN PACIFIC LAYS OFF MORE MEN AT DUNSMUIR

DUNSMUIR, March 19.—The Southern Pacific company has made another cleaning out of its force employed in the car repair shops here, laying off all of the carpenters but Huxson and Swanson, and also J. C. Long, the former foreman of the car shops. The car men, all were laid off except eight. There was a force of 16. The remaining men are working five days in the week and eight hours a day, and as they are paid by the hour, their salary is merely enough to hold them. It is stated by the men that there is no doubt the company would lay off every man in the carshops were it not for needing the remaining men to go out on the wrecker, for which they are called every day or so. It is reported that most of the car work, or repairing, that is absolutely necessary will be done at Red Bluff for awhile at least.

FOUGHT ROGUE RIVER INDIANS IN THE FIFTIES

Captain Francis H. West, an early pioneer and Indian war veteran, a former military and civil engineer, died at Portland Saturday night. Captain West was born in Fredericksburg, Va., June 10, 1832. He was educated in Fairfax institute and the Norfolk Military academy. At the age of 16 years he entered the service of the United States government and was appointed to the Pacific coast survey. He came to San Francisco at once in 1849 on the United States schooner Ewing. His first trip into the Oregon country was made in 1851 to quell an uprising among the Indians of the Rogue river valley. He did not at this time stay in Oregon, but continued in the coast survey service and made a trip to the East Indies, and eventually back to the Atlantic states again. In 1867 Captain West came to Oregon.
