

WOODMEN PLAN BIG LOG ROLLING

Head Council Boak to Visit Medford With Associate Head Officers on April 13—Over Hundred to Be Initiated—Camps from All Parts to Be Here.

Head Council I. I. Boak of the Pacific jurisdiction, Woodmen of the World, accompanied by his associate head officers, who include T. Clinton Venie, of Pasadena, Cal., head adviser; P. E. Snodgrass of Eugene, Or., head banker; C. V. Conson of Denver, Colo., head clerk; Congressman W. C. Hawley of Oregon, chairman of the board of head managers; M. E. Wilson of Boise, Mont., head escort; A. M. McKeel of Salt Lake, head watchman; John Pattison of Spokane, Wash.; E. P. Hawke of Pueblo, Colo., and Dr. James Stenhouse of Denver, head managers, will arrive in Medford Monday, April 13, for the purpose of making an official visit to the local camps in this vicinity and more particularly to initiate a class of 100 candidates for the several camps in Southern Oregon. The local camps will bring a class of candidates to be initiated with a class of Medford Camp No. 100 of Medford, on the night of April 13, at Medford. Governor Chamberlain is also expected to be present.

The head camp offers a cash prize of \$50 to the camp in Southern Oregon bringing the largest number of candidates to the big log rolling, and a heavy solid gold "boss chopper" badge to the neighbor securing the largest number of applications during this campaign. In addition to these prizes the local camps are offering several elegant prizes to the "boosters." This is the first time in the history of the local camp that the head officers have made an official visit en masse, and as they make only five stops in Oregon,

being Portland, Baker City, Roseburg, McMinnville and Medford, the local members are "die-hardists" that this city is one of the five selected and will without doubt give the distinguished visitors a royal welcome.

The Woodmen of the World numbers 550,000 members in the United States, 100,000 of those being in the nine Pacific states and 17,000 of whom reside in Oregon. The order is divided into two jurisdictions known as the Sovereign and Pacific. The Sovereign carries a reserve fund of \$5,000,000, while the Pacific, which is the nine western states, has accumulated a reserve of \$1,000,000. The head banker of the Pacific jurisdiction being P. E. Snodgrass of Eugene, Or., it can be truthfully said that the W. O. W. not only keeps the money in Oregon, but also brings the money from eight other states to Oregon. Its reserve fund is invested in bonds such as school, water, paving and other state, county and municipal bonds.

The local reception committee consists of J. H. Fitzgerald, J. H. M. Atwell, J. W. Wiley, J. W. Lang, Perry Stewart, A. S. Wills, A. W. Lacey, Luther Hazelwood, H. L. Griffin, Charles Turpin, P. E. Martin, William Garrett, W. R. Jackson, L. E. Hoover, G. G. Shirley, M. W. Skoel—in fact, every one of the 200 members of Medford camp is expected to consider him self a member of the committee to assist in "boosting" and making the occasion a splendid success and one long to be remembered.

The local camp meets next Sunday afternoon at Red Men's hall, and every member is expected to be present to assist in making arrangements that will demonstrate that the choppers of Medford know how to "boost."

D. J. Benkey, special organizer, has just returned from a visit to the several camps surrounding and reports splendid meetings and that such camp will do its part to make the big log rolling a success.

the hop acreage of the three states this year.

According to Secretary Joseph Baumgartner of the Oregon branch of the union, an agreement has been drawn up providing for a cut of one-third in the present acreage, and it is believed that a sufficient number of the growers of the three states can be induced to make the proposed reduction in the 1908 output in the hope of saving the market from complete demoralization.

The California growers and union members are the initiators of the latest movement. Whether at the meeting to be held the latter part of the month they will be able to draw the Oregon and Washington growers into line with their views remains to be seen. It is obvious to all at all informed as to conditions in the hop market that a drastic cut in the acreage is a necessity.

For fancy select Winesaps the price was advanced to \$2.75 in the Front street markets today and lower grades have been correspondingly moved up. SOME RECENT SALES IN ROGUE RIVER VALLEY

RESOLUTION.

Be it Resolved, by the City Council of the City of Medford, Oregon, the Mayor approving, That the following proposed amendment to the City Charter of the City of Medford be submitted to the legal voters of said city for their approval or rejection at a special election to be held in said city on the 3d day of April, 1908:

Proposed Amendment to Section 72 of the City Charter of the City of Medford.

The People of the City of Medford do ordain as follows:

That Section 72 of an act of the legislature of the State of Oregon, entitled, "An act to repeal an act entitled, 'An act to incorporate the town of Medford, in Jackson county, Oregon, and limiting its powers and defining the duties of its officers,'" and to repeal an act entitled, "An act to incorporate the town of Medford, in Jackson county, Oregon," approved February 24, 1885, filed in the office of the secretary of state February 21, 1889, and all amendments thereof, and to incorporate the City of Medford, in Jackson county, Oregon, and to define its powers and duties, approved February 6, 1901, and to incorporate the City of Medford, in Jackson county, Oregon, define its powers and duties, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state, February 7, 1905, as amended by the act amendatory thereof, filed in the office of the secretary of state February 13, 1905, and as further amended by the vote of the people of Medford on June 4, 1907, and on March 17, 1908, be and the same is hereby further amended by adding thereto the following:

Subdivision D. In addition to the foregoing warrants and bonds, as authorized in the preceding subdivisions of this section, the said council is further authorized to borrow money on the faith of the city, and for that purpose to issue additional warrants and bonds for the sole purpose of securing, furnishing and installing a gravity supply of pure water for said city; but in the event that said council shall elect to secure, furnish and install a gravity supply of pure water as above mentioned, and shall issue warrants and bonds as provided in this subdivision for such purpose, the total amount of warrants and bonds so issued shall at no time exceed the sum of \$200,000, in addition to the warrants and bonds in the three preceding subdivisions authorized, and in the event that such warrants and bonds shall be issued, such issue shall be in all respects subject to the provisions and restrictions of Subdivision B of this section, except as to the maximum amount of such issue.

Following is the form in which the above amendment will appear upon the ballots at said election: SUBMITTED BY ORDER OF THE CITY COUNCIL. VOTE YES OR NO. Charter Amendment authorizing the installation of a gravity water supply and the issuance of bonds therefor, and limiting the amount of such bonds to \$200,000.
