To the Registered Members of the Democratic Party of Jackson County, Oregon. The democratic state central committee of the state of Oregon has issued a call for a state convention to be held in the city of Portland, Or., on the 10th day of June, 1908, for the purpose of selecting eight delegates to the national convention to be held at Denver, Col., on the 7th day of July, 1908. The day this call Jackson county is entitled to be represented by seven delegates. There is no provision in the district primary law for the selection of these delegates to the state convention. The democratic party is firmly committed to the provisions of the district primary law. Our party recognizes in the right of the people to nominate for office only such candidates as are not fitted to be public servants. But the law having made no provision for a selection of delegates to the state convention, which convention will select delegates to the national convention, and as it is very important that Jackson county should be represented in the selection of these delegates, a mass-meeting of the democrats of Jackson county, etc., is hereby called to meet at Medford, Or., on SATURDAY, THE 28TH DAY OF MARCH, 1908, at the hour of 2 o'clock p. m., of said day, at which time said mass convention will proceed to the election of seven delegates from Jackson county to the said democratic state convention. All REGISTERED members of the democratic party in Jackson county are entitled to be present at this meeting and are earnestly urged to be present and to participate in this mass meeting. E. J.
