Ashton, Or., March 21. To the Registered Members of the Democratic Party of Jackson County, Oregon:

The democratic state central committee of the state of Oregon has issued a call for a state convention to be held in the city of Portland, Or., on the 16th day of June, 1908, for the purpose of electing eight delegates to the national convention to be held at Denver, Colo., on the 7th day of July, 1908. Under this call Jackson county is entitled to be represented by seven delegates.

There is no provision in the state primary law for the selection of those delegates to the state convention.

The democratic party is firmly committed to the provisions of the direct primary law. Our party recognizes in the right of the people to nominate or elect only such candidates as are qualified to be public servants. But we have made no provision for a selection of delegates to the state convention, which convention will select delegates to the national convention, and as it is very important that Jackson county should be represented in the selection of these delegates, a mass meeting of the democrats of Jackson county, Or., is hereby called to meet at Medford, Or., on

SATURDAY, THE 28TH DAY OF MARCH, 1908.
