After characterizing Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy as a woman who spread infamous stories of cures by Christian Science healing which had never been accomplished, at the state house before the committee on public health, yesterday morning, and challenging Alfred Farlow the church's publicity agent, to produce the name of a leper he had claimed had been healed by Christian treatment, Attorney F. W. Peabody of the opposition was nonplussed at the afternoon session, when, following a second day, much to his discomfort, Mr. Farlow arose and named the cured party as Dr. G. W. Barrett, a physician of St. Louis, Mo.

Closely following the producing of the name, W. A. Morse, representing the Christian Scientists, rose to his feet, and, addressing Mr. Peabody, asked him if he would now withdraw his bills, as he had agreed to do if the name was produced.

"Good God, man," was all Peabody could say.

Following the hearing Mr. Farlow telegraphed to St. Louis and received a prompt reply. Both telegrams follow:

"George W. Barrett, 2240A South Grand avenue, St. Louis, Mo.—Do you still claim that you have been healed of leprosy by Christian Science? Give date of healing. Wire immediately.

**HANLEY COMPANY LAND PROPOSAL IS REJECTED**

BURNS, Or., March 24.—William Hill, attorney for the state of Oregon, and the William Hanley company, have received a copy of a decision just handed down by the commissioner of the general land office at Washington, which contains the decision of the register and recorder of the Burns land office recommending for rejection the segregation of nearly 70,000 acres made by the state to be reclaimed by the William Hanley company under the Carey act.

This is a very important decision for Harney county. The lands involved are of the very best in Harney valley and lie in a stretch of country directly tributary to Burns. This vast tract has been tied up for four years, withdrawn from public entry, and the contemplated reclamation by the Hanley company has been retarded by the contest which has culminated in the present decision.

**TO RELAY YAUQUINA LINE FOR EXCURSION TRAVEL**

CORVALLIS, Or., March 24.—As the result of an inspection trip over the Corvallis & Eastern railroad by General Manager J. P. O'Brien and a number of other Southern Pacific officials, it is rumored here that the road to the east, as well as the line extending eastward to Downy, will be put in shape for heavy excursion travel by installation of heavier rails. While it is said the railroad officials do not expect to be able to put the road in the first-class condition which will eventually be accomplished by the time this summer's travel begins, they hope to have it capable of handling the heaviest kind of freight travel to the coast by the summer of 1909.

It is also reported that the Southern Pacific will try the experiment this season of operating a regular train from Portland direct to Yauquina by way of the West Side route to Corvallis.

**HOBBOES MUNCH HAY SOAKED WITH BOOZE**

Marin McLaughlin of Hammond, Or., near Port Stevens, is bringing suit against the Astoria & Columbia River railroad for the cash value of 56 gallons of whiskey which was let out of the barrel during transportation from Portland to Hammond. McLaughlin contends that the barrel was smashed by rough handling. The railroad company maintains that the barrel was defective. At any rate, the booze was lost.

According to one story the barrel was tossed from the freight car onto a couple of bales of hay. When the barrel hit the hay the bottom was smashed in and the hay was drenched with 25 whisky. During the following night the hoboes gathered from far and near like the assemblage of crawfish around a carcass and not only lapped up all the booze but ate all the hay. In consequence McLaughlin wants damages.
