

EGGLESTON MAY RUN FOR COUNTY JUDGE

Friends of Ashland's Recorder Urge Him to Contest Nomination With Judge Dunn—His Many Qualifications for the Position—Good Record.

A number of friends of Captain M. P. Eggleston of Ashland are talking him up for the office of county judge to contest the primary nomination with Judge Dunn. Captain Eggleston's progress gives an excellent picture of his capabilities as an administrator of public affairs and speak of his capacity to maintain discipline, system and order in one of the most important features lacking in the administration of county affairs.

Captain Eggleston is a graduate of West Point and is reported to be a learned and exceptionally intelligent man of affairs, is well known in connection with all the efforts at promotion and exploitation of the resources of the valley in recent years, as well as being exceptionally well informed on matters relating to the various kinds of public roads, engineering enterprises, street paving and municipal matters.

Those who know him seem to feel sanguine that he would prove to be the most progressive man that could be secured for the place, and believe that he is the best equipped individual in the county for the impending change of methods and policies of conducting public business from the old to the new conditions that are taking place in Jackson county.

He is reported to have made a fine record in getting the municipal affairs of Ashland in shape in its several departments after the same had been allowed to get into the worst kind of disorder. At the recent city election a number of prominent citizens who had become offended at his vigorous and successful management of the city's business undertook to defeat him with D. B. Grant, the present undersheriff of Jackson county, and after an energetic campaign in which policies and issues were thoroughly discussed Captain Eggleston was re-elected by a majority of over three to one in a total vote of 850.

It was reported that he had already circulated his petition, but inquiry today brought the information that he had not yet taken any steps in that direction, but would do so as he is convinced that there existed in several parts of the county a sentiment sufficiently strong to convince him that he was wanted for the position. He did not wish to go out after the nomination unless assured that there was a considerable demand, but if nominated would make a vigorous campaign and let the people know where he stood on the issues that have to do with the county court and the taxpayers and citizens of the county.

SCHOOL NOTES

PROCLAMATION

Whereas, There was submitted to the voters of the City of Medford, Oregon, at a special election held for that purpose on March 17, 1908, a proposed amendment to Section 72 of the City Charter of the said City of Medford; and

Whereas, on the said 17th day of March, 1908, the City Recorder in my presence and in the presence of the City Council of said city, did canvass the votes given for and against the said amendment; and

Whereas, it was ascertained and determined upon such canvass that there were 102 votes cast for and 51 votes against the said amendment, and that said amendment received an affirmative majority of the total number of effective votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under the provisions of the law;

Now therefore, I, S. B. Trowbridge, acting Mayor of the City of Medford, Oregon, in the absence of the Mayor from the city, in obedience to the duty of the power and authority

vested in me by law, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the City of Medford, and do announce and declare that the whole number of votes cast in the City of Medford at said election, for and against the said amendment, was as hereinbefore stated, and that the said amendment received the affirmative majority of the total number of votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under the provisions of law, and that the said amendment shall be and is in full force and effect from the date of this proclamation, and that the following is the full text of the said amendment:

Proposed Amendment To Section 72 of the City Charter of the City of Medford.

The people of the City of Medford do enact as follows:

That section 72 of an act of the legislature of the State of Oregon, entitled "An act to repeal an act entitled 'An act to incorporate the Town of Medford, in Jackson County, Oregon, and limiting its powers and defining the duties of its officers,'" and to repeal an act entitled "An act to incorporate the Town of Medford, in Jackson County, Oregon," approved February 24, 1887, filed in the office of the secretary of State February 21, 1889, and all amendments thereof, and to incorporate the City of Medford, in Jackson County, Oregon, and to define its powers and duties, approved February 6, 1907, and to incorporate the City of Medford, in Jackson County, Oregon, define its powers and duties, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of State February 7, 1905, as amended by the act amendatory thereof filed in the office of the secretary of State February 13, 1905, and as further amended by the vote of the people of Medford on the 4th day of June, 1907, be and the same is hereby amended by adding

thereto the following:

"Subdivision C. In addition to the foregoing warrants and bonds, as authorized in the two preceding subdivisions of this section, the said council is further authorized to borrow money on the faith of the city, and for that purpose to issue warrants and bonds for the sole purpose of further improving the water distributing system of said city, provided that the mains installed in improving said system shall all be of cast iron of approved design and manufacture; but in the event that said council shall elect to install a system of cast iron mains as above mentioned, and shall issue warrants and bonds as provided in this subdivision for such purpose, the total amount of warrants and bonds so issued shall at no time exceed the sum of \$25,000 in addition to the warrants and bonds in the two preceding subdivisions authorized, and in the event that such warrants and bonds shall be issued, such issue shall be in all respects subject to the provisions and restrictions of subdivision B of this section, except as to the maximum amount of such issue.


